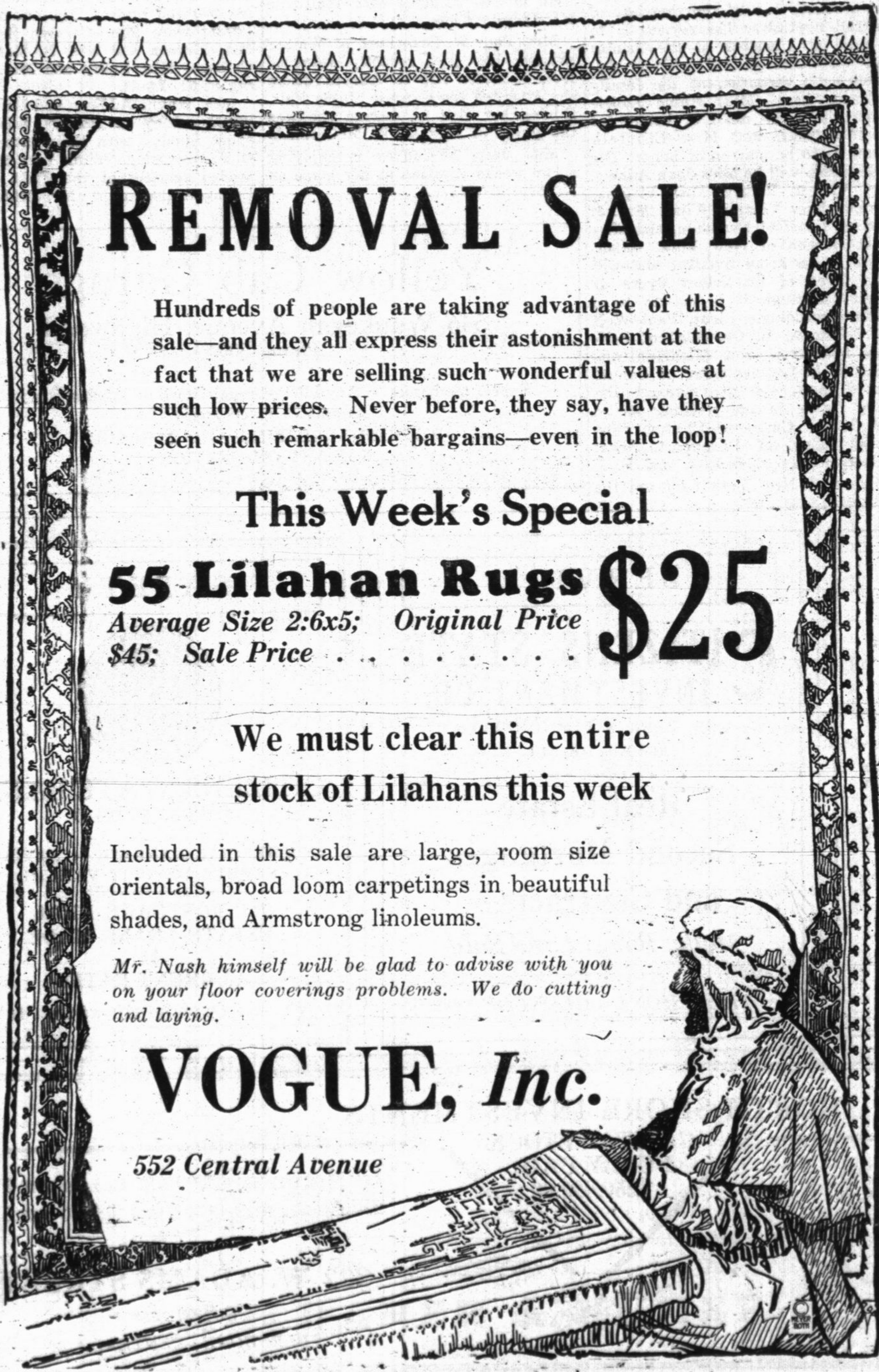

State Plans Repair of Sheridan Road

Repairing of Sheridan road from Chicago, along the north shore, through Waukegan and on to the state line, is to be one of the first projects to be carried out by the state highway commission at an early date, according to the recommendations made to the Governor by the Highway advisory committee.

The committee has also advised the governor that immediate steps should be taken in furthering the plan to widen the paying on the highway from Chicago to the state line. The program provides that the highway be widened for a width of 40 feet from Chicago to the state line. The pavement on the highway outside of the cities along the route has a width of but 18 feet at present.

The repair work recommended by the committees provides for the removal of many thousands of feet of worn paving and their replacement. Reports that while the completion of the paving on Green Bay road through to the state line has relieved Sheridan road of much of the travel that it boasted of in former years still it is one of the heaviest traveled highways in the state.
