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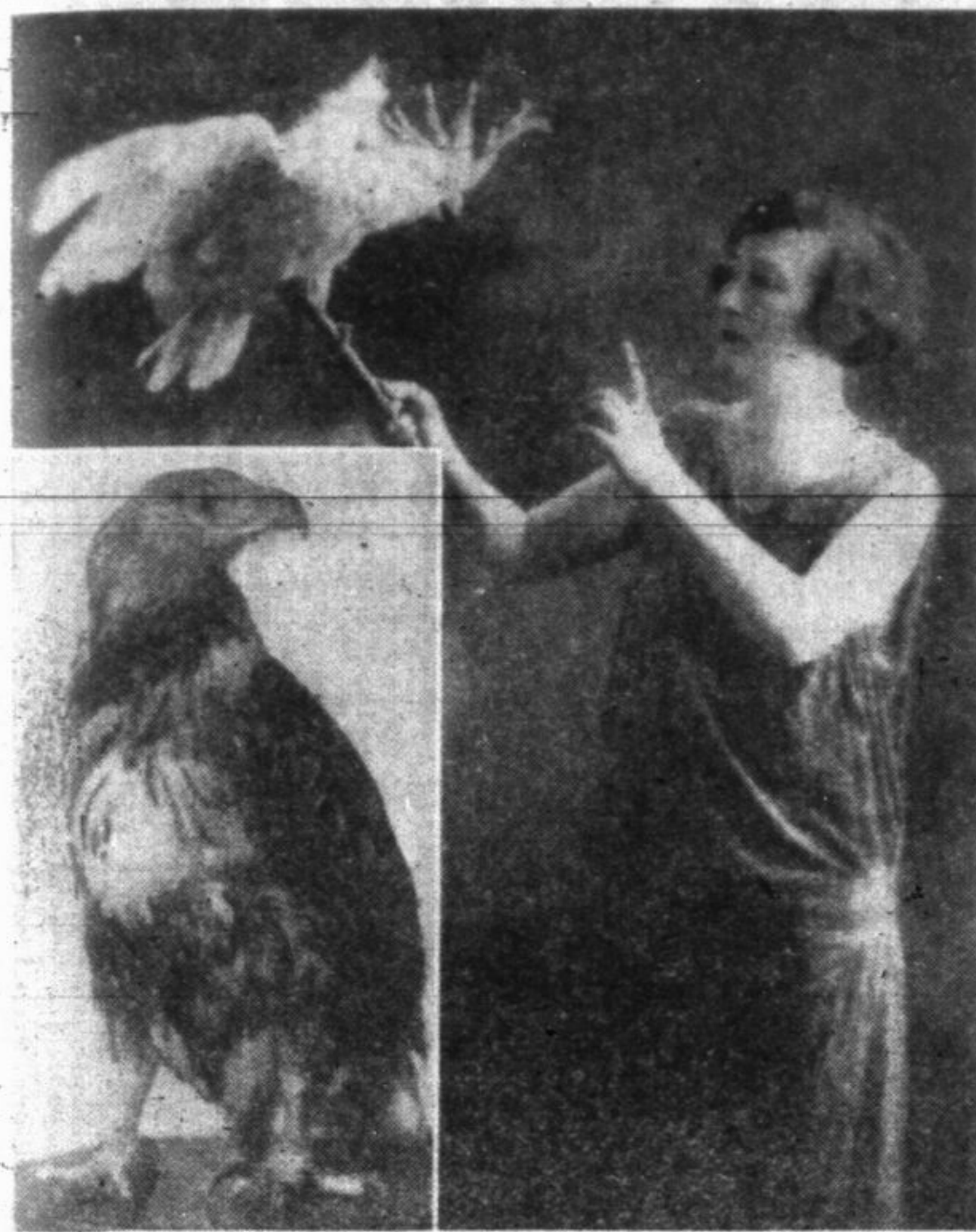

### BRIEF NEWS ITEMS FROM LAKE COUNTY

#### Interesting Happenings About This Part of North Shore and Vicinity

Five thousand visitors attended the Wisconsin American Legion convention at Kenosha last week, which opened with a parade to Washington Park Bowl where a crowd of 8,000 witnessed a rodeo and bicycle races.

Burglars last week broke into the central offices of the high school at Waukegan and the offices of the Waukegan Lumber company, shattered windows, and doors and ruined the safes in both offices but failed to get any loot of any value. No money was found in either place according to the police.

Quo warranto proceedings, questioning the right to organize a community high school district in the Fox Lake, Ingleside and Grass Lake district, was started last week by States Attorney A. V. Smith on the petition of A. C. Schultz, a resident of the district.

Mrs. Mary H. Petrie, widely known in Waukegan, passed away at her home in that city last week following a stroke of paralysis. Mrs. Petrie was born March 28, 1865, in Fulton county, but for thirty-three years has been a resident in North Chicago and Waukegan.

Crashing in the big plate glass window in Krebs Clock Shop at 812 Glen Flora avenue, Waukegan, one night last week, burglars scooped up about \$800 in watches, uncut diamonds and other jewelry and escaped in a waiting automobile.

Mrs. Addie Schaffer, 73 year old retired Millinery store owner of Antioch, who tried to commit suicide by leaping into a slough in Antioch last week, was transferred from the

county hospital to the county home at Libertyville the latter part of the week. She is penniless and without relatives.

James Schreck, of Grass Lake, last week was raided and found to have a quarter slot machine, according to State's Attorney A. V. Smith. He was fined \$100 and costs. James Krisman, Sand Lake, found to have beer and whiskey in his place, was fined \$500 and costs, the prosecutor reported.

#### Waukegan City Hall Remodeling Halted

Suspension of all activities in the remodeling of the proposed city office building on the Higley tract at Utica and Madison streets until a final decision as to its right of ownership is obtained by the city administration from the higher courts was decided by the Waukegan city council as a result of the reverse decision, returned in the district appellate court last week.

Indications also point to an extended delay in the occupancy of the building by the city administration, at the least, but judging from expressions of members of the council there will be quarter shown in its fight to hold possession of the building under what they contend is a legal right vested in the city.

The matter will be carried to the United States Supreme court if necessary, but all are confident that a favorable decision will be returned in the State Supreme court to which the case will be appealed immediately.
