## Highland Park Women Learn of Joy Brought by Flower Guild Work

Highland Park people who have been sending their flowers to Chicago for distribution by the Flower guild to the sick, poor and lonely, have been greatly interested in a letter received from Madonna Center, Mary Agnes Amberg, executive director. Miss Amberg writes to Mr. T. V. Purcell, president of the Chicago Plant Flower and Fruit guild, as follows:

"Last week we had such a happy surprise when a car drove up and left a wonderful box of flowers for us. Later on we learned through a phone call that they were from the Flower and Fruit guild, through the intercession of someone who knew of our work in this congested district.

"It would be quite impossible to tell you of the joy that they gave. We have so many hundreds of little children and older boys and girls coming to our settlement and the love of what is beautiful is so marked in so many of them. Yet, so many hundreds of neighborhood homes are lacking in much that makes life lovely and attractive; and the trees in the neighborhood could almost be counted on one hand, and little patches of grass are sometimes whole squares apart.

"We have often longed to be numbered among the beneficiary institutions of your guild and the longing is even more keen now that we have realized somewhat of the happiness

that even just one week's generous gift gave to our proteges. If you ever can, do please remember Madonna Center and place it on your list.

"The women of Highland Park," said Mrs. T. A. Moore, chairman of the Flower guild committee of the Highland Park Garden Study club, "are interested with every garden lover in this vicinity in sharing their flowers to give a coveted treat to a child in a hospital, or an old lady in a barren tenement room.

"The flowers are distributed by the Flower guild, through the Visiting Nurses' association and Infant Welfare stations, and to institutions, such as Municipal Tuberculosis Sanitarium, Day Nurseries, etc.

"Bring or send your flowers, vegetables, fruit or plants to the North Western railroad station, Highland Park, Friday mornings, between 7:30 and 9:30 where two members of the guild committee will be waiting to receive your donations."
