

GOLF EXPERTS MEET ON LASKER ESTATE

U. S. G. Green Section and Mid-West Greenkeepers Assn. Hold Session Monday

The U. S. G. Green section and the Mid-West Greenkeepers association held a most successful joint meeting at the A. D. Lasker estate, west of Lake Forest on Monday, Aug. 26. More than 200 greens chairmen, greenkeepers, professionals and supply men were present from all parts of the U. S. John Montieth, Jr., who conducts the experimental station at Washington for golf section in the Agriculture department, and who has charge of the station established at the Lasker estate, in a thorough manner explained the experiments being conducted in the growth of grasses.

Grass Growing Experiments

Various grasses are being grown in plots subject to varying conditions to ascertain their value for golf courses. Another interesting illustration given by Mr. Monteith was the capular capacity of the various soils and sand by placing tubes containing such materials with the lower end submerged in water. Mr. Harrison who is also conducting experiments on the Lasker Estate plot made a test showing the different effects on the root system of grasses grown at various heights. The lectures given by both of these gentlemen were of interest and importance to those interested and engaged in the maintaining of golf courses as their technical knowledge and experience are recognized throughout by the golfing public. Mr. Trigillis who has charge of the golf course and the experimental plots at Lasker Estate is a man of experience, whose ability is well known and much credit is due him for his painstaking care of the station which is so necessary in the conducting of experiments of this kind.

The Mid-West Golfers owe a lasting gratitude to Mr. Lasker for the generosity he has shown not only on this occasion but in providing the ground for the experimental station.

Lunch Served

After the meeting a lunch was served at the Log Cabin some distance from the golf course for those who desired it, and in the afternoon many availed themselves of the opportunity to play on the course which is one of the finest in the middle west, prizes being offered by the Green Section and the Mid-West association.
