**DEERFIELD-SHIELDS  
HIGH SCHOOL OPENING**

**Freshmen to Attend Sept. 3 and  
General School Starts on  
September 4**

Deerfield-Shields Township high school opens on Tuesday, Sept. 3. However, only first year students are expected the first day. They will meet their teachers and learn where to go and what to do without the confusion of a big crowd. The general opening will be on Tuesday, Sept. 4.

It is not expected that the number in attendance will be greatly augmented over last year. Lake Forest pupils made the most notable growth last year. The number from that city increased from 170 in 1928 to 205 in 1929. It is difficult to account for this, for the grammar schools of Lake Forest made no such advance in numbers. Several entered the high school who had not previously attended schools in Lake Forest.

The Marigold Bus company is withdrawing the school service busses formerly supplied and new arrangements are being made to transport the students from Deerfield, Everett, and Northbrook.

**Man Employed Here Is  
Killed as Motorcycle  
Collides with Truck**

Alvin Koehler of Wilmette, a foreman employed on the Highland Park waterworks improvement work, was fatally injured last Friday night when his motorcycle collided with a truck near Deerfield and died at 4 o'clock Saturday morning in the Highland Park hospital.

According to the account of the former accident given to the Deerfield police by John Webber, driver of the truck belonging to the Davidson Cartage company, 1600 South Rockwell street, Chicago, Koehler seemed to have turned his motorcycle toward the truck. He was speeding southward on an empty road and as he rounded a curve, he swerved to the left directly into the path of the truck. The driver, according to his story, almost ran off the road in an attempt to avoid the oncoming motorcycle, but couldn't pull the ponderous vehicle out of the way.

Webber notified the Deerfield police and the injured man was taken to the Highland Park hospital, where it was found that he had sustained a compound fracture of the skull and a fractured arm.

The body was removed to the Kelley Funeral home in Highland Park, where the inquest was held Saturday. Webber was exonerated by the verdict.

Lester T. Tiffany, chief of police of Lake Forest, and formerly chief deputy sheriff for three years, is a candidate for the Republican nomination for the office of sheriff of Lake county at the primary election to be held April 8, 1930.

Although the primary election is about seven months away, Chief Tiffany has given his consent to a group of interested men and women with the interests of Lake county at heart to have his name announced as a candidate for sheriff at this time, according to publicity sent out by his friends.

Mr. Tiffany served as chief deputy in the sheriff's office for three years and prior to that time was a deputy in that office. Since September, 1926, he has been chief of police of Lake Forest, in which office he has made an enviable record, and he has the unanimous endorsement of the Lake Forest city council in his race for the sheriff's office.

During his term as chief at Lake Forest the police department there has handled 1,700 cases and a large number of indictments have been returned. So thoroughly have the cases been prepared and so efficient (Continued on Page 39)

**ELM PLACE SCHOOL  
OPENING SEPT. 9TH**

**Also New Green Bay Road  
Building; Both in Dist. No.  
107; List of Faculty**

With the opening of school on Monday, Sept. 9, district 107 will begin the maintenance of two separate school plants. To the newly completed school building on Green Bay road which is already being referred to as the Green Bay school will be assigned all pupils under the fourth grade who live west of the Northwestern railroad right-of-way. All other pupils will go to the other building that make up the Elm Place plant. There will be seven groups of pupils at the Green Bay school, the full capacity of the school, and twenty-six groups at Elm Place, with a staff of forty-one teachers in charge of class rooms and rooms for special activities in the whole school system.

**At Green Bay School**

At Green Bay school there are seven regular classrooms, one being a kindergarten, and three activity rooms, with a large room for games and assembly purposes. At Elm Place, the kindergarten-primary building has four class rooms, one being a kindergarten, and three activity rooms. The elementary building has a large playroom, two activity rooms, largely for shop purposes, and twelve classrooms. The intermediate building has ten classrooms and special rooms for general shop-work, for science, music, drawing and sewing, and the large auditorium besides.
