

## Few Regulars Left in Northwestern Football Squad; Many Recruits

Seventeen lettermen, seven of whom can be regarded as regulars, are among the 60 prospective candidates of Northwestern university's football team who have been invited by Coach Dick Hanley to report for the opening practice, September 16.

Regulars, around whom Coach Hanley plans to construct his 1929 team, are Capt. Henry Anderson, guard, Henry Bruder, William Calderwood and Bill Griffin, backs, Lee Hanley, quarter, Milton Erickson, center and Frank Baker, end.

Replacing Walt Holmer, all-western fullback last year, together with seven other lettermen who are lost through graduation, is causing considerable concern on the part of the coaching staff. With Holmer gone, the Wildcat eleven will be deprived of one of the greatest kickers and passers developed in the conference in recent years. Other regulars gone are "Yatz" Levison, quarter, Justin

Dart, guard, Tom Verdell, end, and Frank Sinkler, Harry Kent and John Hazen, tackles.

These players, for the most part, must be replaced by sophomore material, the ability of which is still to be tested. Several of these new men show promise but their inexperience is worrying the staff.

Capt. Henry Anderson is the only regular guard back while all of the first string tackles were erased through graduation. Wade Woodworth, an end last year, is to be moved over to tackle and stands a fine chance of landing a regular assignment.

Several sophomore tackle aspirants will make a strong bid for a job. They include Paul Hutchinson, Paul Engbritsen, Jack Riley, Dallis Marvil and Cliff Kinder. The first three of this group will average close to 195 pounds.
