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## SO. GREEN BAY ROAD IMPROVEMENT BEGUN

### Highways Construction Co. Has Work Well Under Way; Expect Good Progress

Work has been started by the Highways Construction company on the new South Green Bay road widening and paving contract. Head walls for outlets of the storm sewers are being built, and E. E. Farmer, head of the Highways Construction company expects to have all apparatus on the ground and excavation work well under way this week.

Mr. Farmer says that he expects to finish the entire improvement, which is one and one-sixteenth miles in length, by the middle of November, or by December 1, at the latest, unless there are unforeseen obstacles, and when "Zeke" says he'll do something, he usually makes good.

### Good Work

All work done in the past by this company has always been more than satisfactory, judging from favorable reports, and Highland Park is to be congratulated on having a construction concern of its own with such a fine record for efficiency.

Among the larger contracts the Highways Construction company has carried to successful completion are the First street, Elm Place and Laurel avenue improvement, three miles of concrete paving on Sheridan road, Glencoe; two large improvements at Indian Hill subdivision in Wilmette; Moseley subdivision on South Green (Continued on Page 40)

## Swedish Lecturer to Talk Here Monday

Dr. Leonard Stromberg, who is pastor of the Swedish Methodist church of Oakland, Neb., will give a lecture at the Swedish Methodist church of Highland on Monday evening, September 9, at eight o'clock. He is also noted for his verse writing. His poetry has taken a number of prizes in the National contests in this country.

## Public Schools To Open Monday, Sept. 9; High School Starts

Schools in District 107 and District 108 will open for the fall and winter sessions on Monday September 9, and active preparations are under way for the beginning of the school year.

The Deerfield-Shields high school opened Tuesday of this week, freshmen registering the first day and the entire school being under way on Wednesday. Enrollment figures were not obtainable on Wednesday as they were not fully compiled, it was reported at the school.

In District 107 the chief new feature will be the opening of the Green Bay Road school, just completed for the lower grades in that section. This is a fine new structure and a credit to the district and the city. The Elm Place school also in this district is ready for the opening on Monday.

In District 108 Lincoln, Ravinia, West Ridge and Braeside schools will open on Monday, September 9, and everything is reported in readiness for the reception of teachers and students for the beginning of the new school year in these schools.

Highland Park has reason to be proud of its schools in both districts with their exceptionally efficient staffs of teachers and there is every indication that another successful school year is about to begin in the schools of both districts.

## DEERFIELD TO HAVE NEW BANK SHORTLY

### Perfect Organization and Plans Under way for Fine Building; Start Soon

Plans have been completed and work will start as soon as all local bids have been returned on the new modern banking house of the Citizens State Bank of Deerfield. It will be located on the east side of Waukegan road, adjoining the northeast corner of Waukegan and Deerfield roads, and it is planned to have it completed by the latter part of October. Solon L. Reilly, of Glencoe and Chicago, is the architect.

The building will be featured by an Indiana limestone front, artistically embellished with ornaments of bronze. Banking quarters, safety deposit vaults and a large store will comprise the first floor plans. The second floor will be divided into groups of offices for physicians, surgeons and dentists, with every modern facility provided.

### Safety Deposit Vault

The safety deposit vault will be of the latest high-grade burglar and fire-proof construction, assuring unsurpassed safety for valuables and providing every comfort and convenience for the bank's patrons. Among these will be coupon rooms, with an attendant always in charge.

The Citizens State Bank of Deerfield was chartered by the Illinois Banking department on July 15, this year, with fully paid capital, surplus and reserves of \$62,500.

E. K. Butler, II, who is also an officer of the Glencoe bank, is vice-president.
