Martin Defeats Olson in Play-Off of Amateur Open: Pairings for Club Champ.

At Sunset Valley Golf Course the labor Day week-end was one of the most successful of the season and many golfers took advantage of the fair weather.

Great Season

The play during this season has been greater than ever before on this course, 23,471 persons having registered for play between April 1st and September 1, 1929. Many of those, registering for play, played more than 18 holes on the day of registration and although the play is heavier than the year previous, the increase took place on the week days and not on Sundays or holidays. The play on Sundays and holidays this season will average 100 less per day. Twenty per cent of the total play was by non-residents, this being 7 per cent lower than the year previous. Non-residents are charged on Sunday forenoons and holiday forenoons and after 12 o'clock noon and on Saturdays, while on week days there is a nominal charge. It was the increase of the Sunday morning rate that was responsible for reducing the number of non-resident registration at this time.

The caddies had their annual tournament last Friday, and about 36 of them entered. All were awarded prizes of some kind, including sweaters, knickers, shirts and neckties, and they were greatly pleased and surprised at the wholesale awards.

He made a plea for federal prosecution of the Radio Corporation of America and large affiliated interests in the radio manufacturing field, according to a lengthy dispatch to the Chicago Daily News from its Washington representative, Robert Mack, in Tuesday evening's issue.

Mr. Schuette formerly was a war correspondent for the Daily News and later was connected with the Herald-Examiner and is widely known for his excellent service in both these connections. He resigned his newspaper position when he accepted the important post of executive secretary of the Radio Protective association.

BODY OF WOMAN FOUND ON BEACH

Wife of E. Mocogni of Highland Drowned Early Monday; Puzzles Relatives

The lifeless body of Mrs. Frieda Mocogni, wife of Egidio Mocogni, alderman of Highwood and well known business man, was found early Monday morning lying on the beach near the foot of Edgcliff avenue, Highland Park. The indications were that she had drowned, as her clothing was water soaked and partially covered with sand.

Just what happened on that lonely beach at that early hour probably nobody ever will know, but friends and relatives who know of the ideal home life of the Mocogni family believe that in all likelihood Mrs. Mocogni may have fallen in a fainting spell on the stones of the beach near the water, or into the water, which washed over her causing her death from drowning.

Mrs. Mocogni had been suffering greatly from hay fever of late, but had told her husband on Sunday evening that she felt some better.

Discovery of Body

Discovery of the body was made by occupants of a house overlooking the beach, and they summoned the police. The identity of the drowned woman was not cleared up until her husband reported her to be missing from home.
