### Open Season on Ducks Begins September 24

Hunters in Lake county will be interested in the announcement made by Deputy State Game Warden Henry Kern to the effect that in accordance with a change in the state game code, the open season on ducks, geese, brants, coots and snipe (Wilson or Jack), does not start until September 24. Heretofore the season has opened September 16 and closed December 31.

To make up for the lateness of the season this year, the time limit has been extended from December 31 to January 7, inclusive.

Deputy Kern has issued his warning to Lake county hunters in hopes they will not violate the new law and subject themselves to arrest.

Kern will be out to enforce the new regulation.

### Highwood May Be First to Face Trial Under New Booze Law

Francis O'Niel, 239 Evolution avenue, Highwood, in probability will be the first charged with driving an automobile while intoxicated to face trial in circuit court under the new law which provides for a jail sentence as well as a fine in the event of a conviction.

O'Niel it is charged drove his machine into a car belonging to Hubert K. Schwall of 233 Avers avenue, Chicago, on the Diamond Lake road south of Mundelein, recently resulting in injury to Mrs. Schwall. The machine then plunged on and crashed into a car occupied by Mrs. Margaret Kellogg of 3119 Fulton boulevard, Chicago, injuring her and her son Charles. The O'Niel car then crashed a machine owned by Albert Bronson of 2334 Washburn avenue, Chicago. All of the machines were badly damaged, according to the Waukegan Sun.

O'Niel was arrested on a complaint filed by Schwall and was given a hearing before Judge W. A. Overholzer in Mundelein police court. He was bound over to await the action of the grand jury on bonds of \$2,000, the report says.

### Urge Motorists to Drive Carefully to Safeguard Children

With the opening of virtually all public, parochial and private schools in September, the added number of children on the streets will constitute an extra hazard to driving which calls for the exercise of additional care on the part of car owners, points out a bulletin issued by the accident prevention department of the Chicago Motor club.

"There will be many little ones of five and six years of age leaving the safety of their own homes to venture out into the streets, a world unknown to them, for the first time," the bulletin stated. "Those youngsters, entirely unversed in protecting themselves from traffic dangers, will present a problem even to the habitually careful driver. The older children, also, are not so careful in the fall as in other times of the year. Unless their parents have 'carried on' during the summer, the safety education they received in school during the last semester is but a vague memory. It will be some time before they may be expected to resume the careful habits inspired during the regular school year by the school boys' safety patrol and the safety posters in school rooms.

"While every car owner should, of course, be extremely cautious at all times, they should be doubly so for some time after the schools open. Such a policy is certain to result in a drastic reduction of deaths and injuries among the children. Still another manner in which motorists can co-operate in this work is to comply with the signals of the school boys' patrol. When those boys raise their hands as a signal for cars to stop, they do so in order to protect young lives. The efficiency of the patrols is unquestioned; the movement has spread until it is now nationwide.

### Miss Kendall Leaves Library Staff Soon

Miss E. Louise Kendall, for the past five years a member of the staff of the Highland Park Public Library leaves next week for Cleveland, Ohio, to enter the School of Library Science at Western Reserve university. Miss Kendall tried the entrance examinations in June and was notified some weeks ago that she had successfully filled all the requirements.

Her position has been filled by Miss Elizabeth Wyant of Chicago who graduated with honors in June from the Library School of the University of Illinois. Miss Wyant comes well equipped to aid in increasing the usefulness of the reference department of the library, in which field she has specialized. She is a graduate of the University of Chicago in 1927. She is now living in Highland Park at 108 Dale avenue.

### Ferry Hall Opens For 61st Year Next Week; New Buildings Grow

Ferry Hall opens for its sixty-first year of work next week with promise of having some of its long cherished hopes fulfilled in the new buildings rapidly nearing completion. Temporarily, every corner of the old buildings as well as the Senior cottage will be in use. Former students return on September 11, and opening chapel services take place Wednesday at one-thirty o'clock.
