Hospital Committee to Report to Board at September Session

The special hospital committee of seven members of the county board of supervisors, headed by Supervisor Edward M. Mawman as chairman, who have been seeking means of reducing the expense of operating a county hospital, will be in a position to report at the September session of the board, Mawman reported last week.

He and Supervisor David Van Pattern of Newport township will meet Sept. 6 for the purpose of drafting a resolution, listing their findings in this investigation which lasted all summer.

All of the members of the committee, Mawman pointed out, were agreed that the operation of the institution under the present policy was as economical as could be attained, according to the Waukegan Sun.

Any reduction in expenses, he declared, would have to be reached through a change of program. It is on this that the members are puzzled and are groping with the regular committee in an effort to find a solution.

While the hospital has been economical the board has been perplexed because the patients are so numerous that the expense has become a burden to the county.

Parking Problem Is Solved For Patrons

The first shop in Evanston to make a practical provision for solving the parking problem is that of Pool & Piper, Inc. This store has taken steps to eliminate for its patrons the difficulty of locating parking space in the downtown Evanston shopping district, at the same time relieving the purchaser of the worries of overtime parking.

Shoppers intending to make a visit to the Pool & Piper store will drive to the University garage, a few steps north on Chicago avenue; they will request a sales receipt at the show store which will be honored as payment at the University garage for three hours' parking. Drivers may park for a longer period, however, paying the usual rate only for time above three hours.

"Our customers come many miles from other communities along the north shore," said E. W. Piper, "but many of them have found problems of parking so acute that they have often been tempted to board a train for the loop as the easier solution. We are taking the initiative by introducing practical measures to keep Evanston a convenient place in which to shop."

"We expect our efforts to be of value to our own store and to neighboring shops. We believe that other retail stores will find it necessary to make a similar move in this direction."

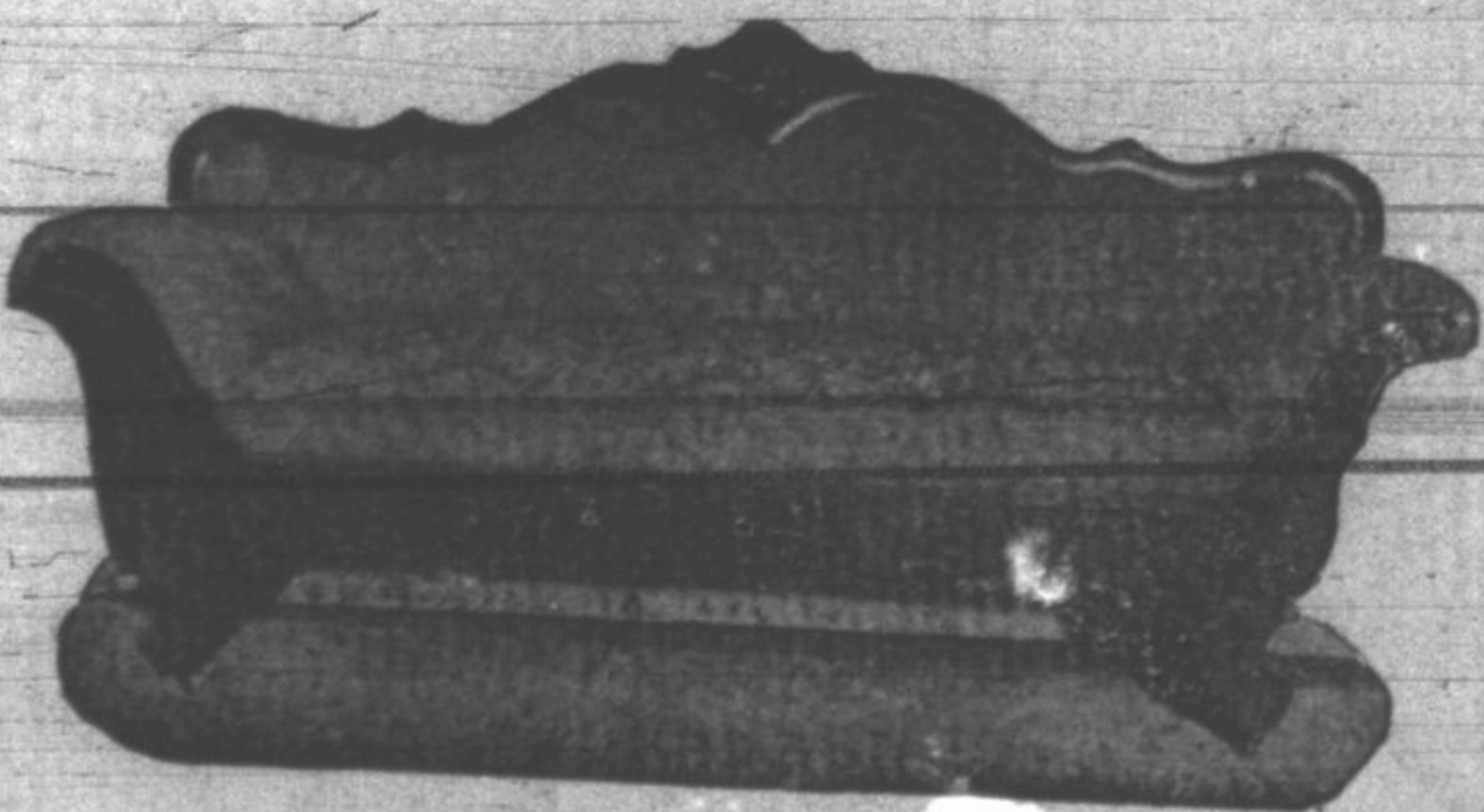
