Fewer Autos Purchased by Installment Method During Past Year, Claim

percentage of autoists are buying of ten cents a pound. their cars on the installment plan is disproved by statistics furnished by finance companies, according to a survey of the American Motorists association, in conjunction with the Automobile club of Ilinois.

"Credit sales of new cars last from Europe. year were 10 per cent smaller than in 1926," the association declares. "In 1925, a total of 68.2 per cent of all new cars sold were bought on time payments, extending over periods of from six to eighteen months. Last to-wit: year, reports of finance companies show, only 58.1 per cent of all new cars purchased were sold on the installment plan."

The average direct loss per repossessed car-the amount owing minus the amount received from sale-was \$56 for automobiles sold on 12 or less equal monthly payments of \$75 on cars sold on 13 to 18 equal monthy linstallments.
