Recommend County **Hospital Patient** List Be Published

Members of the special investigating committee appointed to eliminate large expenditures at the county hospital on Tuesday concluded their work by signing a resolution providing for the publication of the names of persons receiving aid at the institution.

This, it was argued by Supervisor Edward Mawman of Lake Bluff, would make the hospital available for residents of the county who were paupers. Publication of the list would curtail the general usage of the institution by officials and friends of officials, according to board members. The hospital, in the year just closed, spent \$91,000 or \$26,000 more than allowed by the budget. Entire operating expenses for the county only reached \$558,000.
