

GIRL HURT AS CAR PLUNGES IN RAVINE

Miss Buhl of Highland Park,
Ferry Hall Student; Injured
Monday Afternoon

Miss Felicite Buhl, aged 17, daughter of George A. Buhl, well known Chicago realtor, residing at 368 Laurel avenue, Highland Park, is in the Fort Sheridan hospital seriously injured as the result of an accident Monday afternoon, when her Packard Phaeton plunged over the Sheridan road bridge into the ravine at the south limits of Lake Forest, adjoining the Army post.

Miss Buhl suffered a bad fracture of the right leg which also was severely lacerated, according to reports from the hospital. The broken bones were set Monday afternoon by Major D. V. Emmerson, head surgeon at the Fort, and unless infection develops in the torn tissues sufficiently to make necessary amputation, it is believed that the leg can be saved. The young woman received other injuries of less serious nature in the perilous plunge 30 feet into the ravine.

Recommend County Hospital Patient List Be Published

Members of the special investigating committee appointed to eliminate large expenditures at the county hospital on Tuesday concluded their work by signing a resolution providing for the publication of the names of persons receiving aid at the institution. This, it was argued by Supervisor Edward Mawman of Lake Bluff, would make the hospital available for residents of the county who were paupers. Publication of the list would curtail the general usage of the institution by officials and friends of officials, according to board members.

The hospital, in the year just closed, spent \$91,000 or \$26,000 more than allowed by the budget. Entire operating expenses for the county only reached \$558,000.

The regular hospital committee worked with the special committee in making the investigation and preparing the resolution.

The resolution will be presented to the board at the present session.

N. Sheridan Rd. Bridges Now Open to Traffic; Closed for Two Years

Both the bridges on North Sheridan road, which have been closed for more than two years since the old structures were condemned, are now opened to traffic.

The state has completed the wing walls, and the city has built the approaches. These latter, however, must remain in their present condition with a surface of crushed stone until the natural settling of the fills is completed, after which the regular tar and gravel coating will be given them. This probably will not be until next spring. However, the approaches are now in very fair shape and traffic is again routed over the new bridges.

New Bureau to Aid Property Owners Is Organized; Details

One of the most significant enterprises ever attempted on the north shore has just been organized with headquarters in Evanston. The new organization, known as the North Shore Modernizing Bureau, will arrange for co-operation between all branches of construction, financial and real estate interests for the purpose of making their services more available to the home and property owner.

The local bureau will be affiliated with the Home Modernizing Bureau of the National Building Industries, Inc. It will be an organization, not for profit, to be supported by a combined effort of financial houses, contractors, supply men, architects, employers, and realtors on the north shore. The bureau will in fact be a general clearing house for all branches of the building and allied fields and will operate to aid property owners in their problems of beautifying and modernizing; it will stimulate values and tend to make the north shore even more distinctive as a place to live.

Old City Standpipe Being Torn Down, Has Served for 35 Years

One of the city's old landmarks is going into the discard that is inevitable in the march of progress. The old standpipe adjoining the present city hall will soon disappear after about 35 years of service to the water works department.

With the erection of the large new reservoir in Sunset park the old tank was not needed, and this week the work of razing it was started, a crew of men cutting the steel plates with blow torches and lowering the pieces to the ground with ropes. Thus the old tank will soon be junk.

The standpipe was erected in the winter of 1893-94 and was put in use the summer following. The method of erection was unique. As the steel walls rose water was pumped into the tank and this supported a timber platform on which the men worked. As the walls grew higher the water volume was increased, elevating the raft as needed.

Annual Street Dance Attracts Record Crowd
