H. S. COUNCILORS APPOINT COMMITTEE

As the result of several meetings of a councilor committee picked from the members of the Deerfield-Shields councilor force last spring, a resolution was adopted completely reorganizing this year's force. At a meeting on Thursday, Sept. 5, some of the new councilors met to discuss the new plan, whereby only one councilor is chosen from each session instead of two or three, as formerly. These will constitute the executive force.

From this group the chief and assistant-chief councilors are elected. The chief and his assistant, together with two faculty advisers, then will

appoint students from the hall periods to fill all councilor posts not occupied by those on the executive force.

Out of the executive group, also, various committees are elected or appointed. An assembly committee has already been elected for helping organize assemblies. McPherson Thomas and Katherine Croke compose this committee. Later, ushers will be appointed to preserve order.

A locker committee and a school guide committee will also be chosen. Thus the entire system centers around the executive force.

115 MEN ANSWER H. S. FOOTBALL CALL

One hundred fifteen of Deerfield-Shields men answered Coach Peel's first call for football practice last week. About forty of the boys are out for the lightweight squad and the remainder are on the varsity.

This year the team has much heavier line and an exceptionally fast backfield. Although there are only four lettermen back there are many fellows who were on last year's squad and several from the year before.

There are plenty of candidates for every position, making competition keen, and keeping the boys on their toes and fighting all the time.

Coach Peel is still searching for a good punter, the lack of which is the team's only weakness. As yet no one has exhibited any remarkable ability in that line. For the rest, the team promises to be well balanced.

Hugh Seyfarth, a veteran of two years experience, was elected captain of this season's team by the team last fall.

The regular squad will be much bigger than usual, even after the team and the subs have been picked, so that much new equipment must be bought, including twenty-five new uniforms already ordered.

The team will not be picked much before the first game, and no lineup will be available until the day of the game.

Deerfield's first game will be with Waukegan high school on September 28, at the Deerfield-Shields high school athletic field, Park avenue, Highland Park. The Deerfield boys say that the Waukegan team can expect stiffer competition than encountered last season.

Case of Interest Here Reversed by App. Court

Judgment of \$600 allowed Mary Bryers, of Highland Park, against the Highland Park Transfer Storage company two years ago by a circuit court jury, was reversed and remanded for trial in an order of the appellate court received by J. L. Wilmot, circuit clerk, Tuesday, according to the Waukegan Sun.
