

DETAILS OF GRADE SEPARATION PLANS

North Shore Committee Urges Towns Interested to Push This Project

That grade separation for the north shore can be "commenced within a reasonable time," is the opinion of the North Shore Grade Separation committee representing the towns of Kenilworth, Winnetka, Glencoe and Highland Park. As reported recently in this paper, a petition for grade separation of the North Western and Chicago, North Shore and Milwaukee railroads was filed by the committee last week with the Illinois Commerce commission.

While no prediction can be made as to the length of time which will be required to complete the project, it is the belief of the committee that actual work can be started within reasonable time if the co-operating villages push the matter as rapidly as possible.

A brief and concise memorandum of the work of the committee coupled with a general explanation of the proposed grade separation plan, was issued by the committee at the time of filing the petition with the Commerce commission. It is reprinted herewith: (The petition, printed in the pamphlet form discusses the subject in minutest detail):

Committee's Memorandum

"For the past ten or twelve years the villages along the north shore have been studying the possibilities of eliminating all grade crossings of the North Western and North shore railroads. The north shore district is one of the finest suburban districts adjacent to Chicago and the population of the district has approximately doubled since 1920. There are at present roughly 50,000 people living in the district from Wilmette to Highland Park, and it is estimated that the population will be greatly
