

Private Flying Club to Be Organized

A number of prominent North Shore citizens at a meeting held last week at the Medinah Athletic club started the organization of a private flying club, the first to be formed in the central west although a number are in existence on both the Atlantic and Pacific coasts. Under the form of organization contemplated, the club will own its own aircraft and the members of the club will be able to take flying instructions and use the airplanes belonging to the club for their own purposes about the city and on cross-country flights.

The National Aeronautic association, which is the American representative of the International Aviation Federation governing all sporting and private flying internationally, has been requested to provide the members of this group with full details of their Private Flying club plan.

Among those active in the formation of this North Shore Flying club are: A. A. Henkel of Highland Park, Mr. Paul Fuller of Deerfield, Reed G. Landis of Glencoe, and C. P. Hunter of Highland Park.

It is the hope of the organizers of this club to be well under way this fall with their flying and we are informed that Mr. Hunter will be glad to give information to anyone properly qualified who is interested in joining the club.

The Private Flying club plan was developed by the National Aeronautic association to enable people to learn to fly and enjoy aviation as a sporting and social activity with the maximum of security and the minimum of expense, while at the same time, they would have all of the advantages of social contact with people they enjoy.

Rare Lace Exhibit Attraction at Library

Two countries claim to be the birthplace of lace, Flanders and Italy; but the collection of laces now on exhibition in the lobby at the Highland Park public library shows that many countries have since become famous for the production of the source of wealth which in years past was the cause of much rivalry among kings as well as queens.

The collection was loaned to the library by a Highland Park resident who has gathered it from many places in the old world. Examples are found of rose point lace made in Brussels, duchesse lace from Belgium, filet lace from Italy, bobbin lace from Bruges, Venetian lace from Venice, carrickmacross lace from Ireland, etc.

H. Hudson Moore in his volume entitled The Lace Book gives interesting illustrations of these rare and costly laces which have been heirlooms for generations, and which have a value to persons of taste and culture beyond even that of the family jewels.
