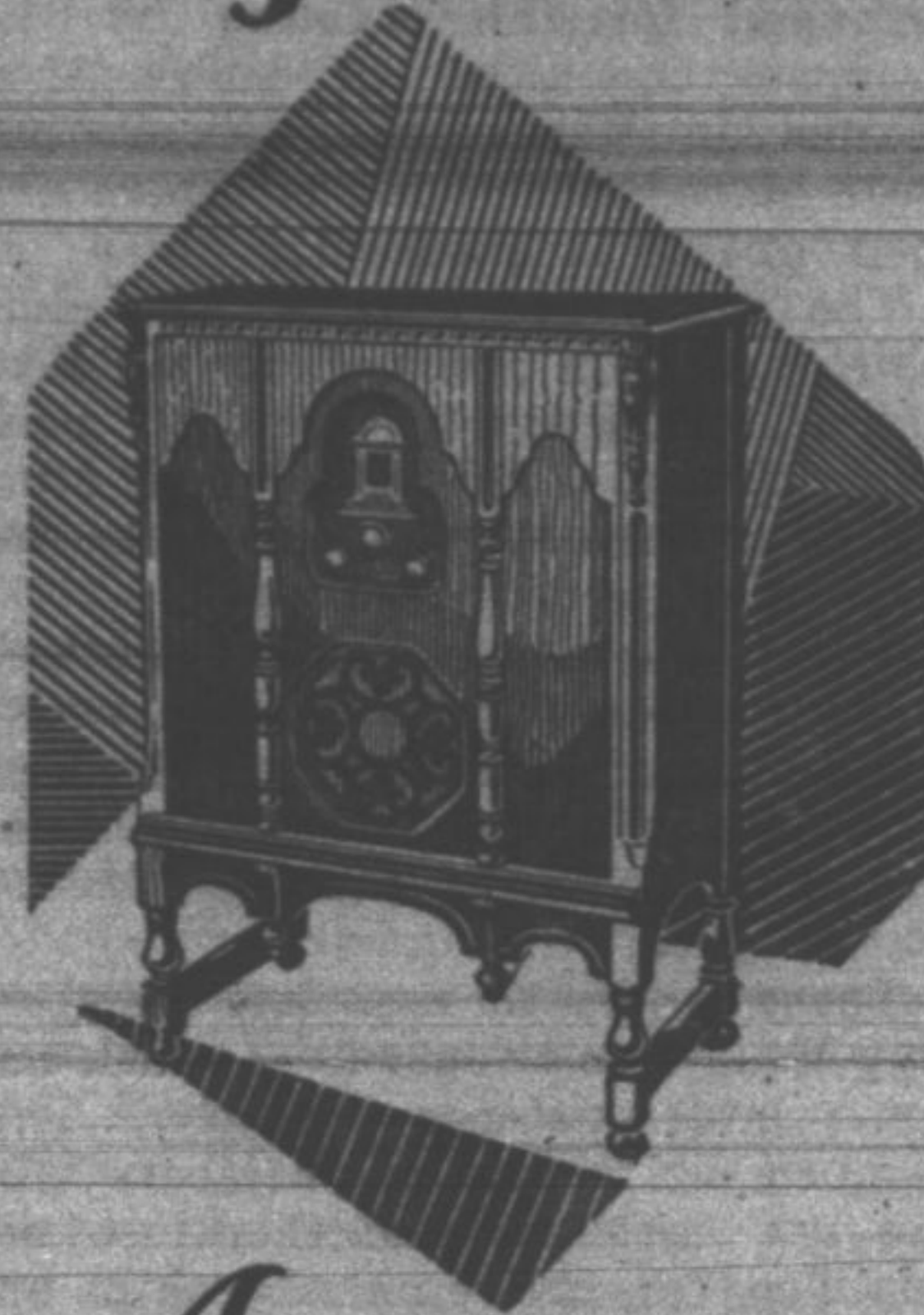
**Ballon Night at
