

TOTAL OF \$648,349 IN COUNTY BUDGET

Actual Operating Expenditures \$499,754; Remainder Bonds and Interest

The annual appropriation ordinance, signed by the finance committee today, went to the county board of supervisors late Friday afternoon. The entire appropriation calls for an expenditure of \$648,349 which covers operation of all county institutions and payments of interest and principal on bond issues.

The finance committee asked \$444,475 for what is termed for "general county operation purposes." This does not include \$50,000 for highway Detention Home which do not draw from the general fund. Thus the actual operating expense of the county, exclusive of bond payments and interest, would reach \$499,475. This is \$25,825 less than a year ago.

The county hospital is to get an appropriation of \$85,000 and \$4,100 for repairs to the buildings.

The slashes were made at the Detention home and the Maintenance fund.

In making the reduction two committees, the Detention home and Maintenance, bore the brunt of the cut, according to A. W. Vercoe, chairman of the finance committee. Both committees agreed, Vercoe declared, that it would be possible for them to operate on less as in the last year they were able to turn back a large portion of their funds to the county

treasurer.

Entire Sum \$499,000.

The appropriation is under the half million dollar mark for the first time in several years. The sizeable sums turned in from county offices aids materially in cutting down the appropriation, according to Vercoe. Treasurer Jay B. Morse, for instance, turned in earnings of \$150,000 alone for the past year which did not include 2 per cent collected fees of approximately \$1,250,000 on amounts deposited on inheritance tax cases in which orders had not been entered. The treasurer has the largest earning capacity by far but several other offices turn in close to \$7,000.

Maintenance Down \$20,000

The Maintenance committee decided it could take a cut from an appropriation of \$70,000 down to \$50,000. At the same time, the Detention Home committee sacrificed its \$10,000 appropriation for a \$5,000 one.

The state is to pay for the court reporters, under a new law, and some relief is anticipated on mother's pensions which cost the county close to \$5,000 annually.
