BRIEF NEWS ITEMS FROM LAKE COUNTY

Interesting Happenings About This Part of North Shore; County Seat

Death last week claimed one of the oldest residents of Lake county, when Mrs. Lydia Winn, aged 97 years and six months, passed away at her home in Waukegan, after a short period of illness which was due to her advanced age.

Resolution approving the project of the purchase by the city and establishment of a highway on the North Beach, Waukegan, was passed by unanimous vote at the meeting of the Waukegan-North Chicago real estate board, last week.

The automobile of Peter Stadfeld, supervisor from Wauconda township, turned turtle on McMahan's corners near Wauconda last week. The road, slippery from rain, caused the accident. He was uninjured.

George C. Johnson, a resident of North Chicago for 34 years and a well known citizen of that community, passed away last week after an illness of one month. He was 82 years of age.

Funeral services for the late Mrs. Frank H. Watrous, who was fatally injured when struck in the head by a golf ball at the Glen Flora Country club was held from the home at 236 Gillette avenue, Waukegan, last Thursday afternoon.

Forty-four out of 4,033 cattle in Lake county were found to be reactors infected with bovine tuberculosis in the three months period ending Sept. 9, according to the report submitted to the county board of supervisors by Dr. Thomas P. Gallahue.

Alfred B. Ames, 89 years old civil war veteran, who was well known in this part of the county, died recently in the National Old Soldiers' Home at Grand Rapids, Mich., according to word received in Libertyville.

R. M. Lobbell, county superintendent of highways, was named last week one of 11 members of a sub-committee to meet in conference with Gov. Emmerson and his advisory committee to meet in conference with Gov. Emmerson and his advisory commission on metropolitan area highways in Springfield.

Tract Near Libertyville Bought by Material Co.

The Lawrence and Houlihan farms located north of Libertyville and consisting of ninety acres have been purchased by the North Shore Material company, from a syndicate of Evanston business men headed by C. A. Wightman. The consideration is understood to be \$70,000, says the Libertyville Independent.

The properties are bordered by Milwaukee avenue on the west and the Des Plaines river on the east.

The property is underlaid with rich deposits of gravel which will be taken out. Eventually the one or more lakes that will be formed will be graded and improved with homes in keeping with the program now being carried out at the old gravel pit in the Park avenue district.
