Things to Cook

In making Parfaits we find that a little different process is necessary from making ice creams, though the result is similar. A Parfait is usually made by adding a hot cooked syrup to either whites or yolks of eggs well beaten, then combining with whipped cream and freezing.

Angel Parfait is made with whites of eggs and, when the yolks of eggs are used, it is called Sunshine or Golden Parfait. Both are very delicate and lovely. Another variation of this kind of a dessert is Biscuit Tortoni, which is made by adding to either of these Parfaits about one-half cup of very finely grated or rolled macaroons.

Biscuit Tortoni is usually frozen in paper Charlotte Russe cups and may be served in the cups, placing each one on a doily on an ice cream plate. Before placing these cups in freeze, they may be decorated by sprinkling over the top a little chopped candied cherry, chopped nuts or candied pineapple.

Angel Parfait
1 teaspoon gelatine
2 tablespoons cold water
1/2 cup boiling water
2 egg whites
Few grains salt
1 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup whipping cream (1/2 pint)

Boil sugar and water to soft ball stage, pour slowly onto stiffly beaten egg whites, beating constantly until thick and creamy. Add gelatine which has been soaked about five minutes in the two tablespoons of cold water. This should be added while the mixture is still hot, to dissolve the gelatine. Add salt and vanilla, chill thoroughly, then fold in the cream beaten thick. Turn into freezing tray of automatic icebox and let freeze without stirring.

Use the same process for making Sunshine Parfait, pouring the hot syrup on the well beaten yolks instead of whites. This should also be beaten constantly to insure a smooth, creamy product.

**Rondout Man Taken
to Ohio; Murder Case**

Salvatore Acquista of Rondout was removed from the county jail Saturday to face charges of murder in Belaire, O., where he is accused of having shot and killed Pietro De Berardo Oct. 12, 1920.

Police Chief Francis Moran of Belaire arrived by automobile Saturday and Acquista was taken from the jail and hurled to Ohio. Acquista was arrested here on a wife beating charge by the sheriff's office and was linked with the murder after the sheriff received a hint of his connection with the case.

**Northwestern Enrolls
Freshman 13 Years Old**

Northwestern university will enroll as a freshman this week one of the youngest college students in the country. He is Harold M. Finley of McConnellsville, Ohio, who was only 13 years old last February. At the age when many boys have not yet entered high school, he is entering a university.

Harold was graduated in June with highest honors from the Malta-McConnellsville high school and was valedictorian of his class. During his four years in high school his grades in all subjects never fell below E and were the highest ever given by the school. He was awarded a medal for being the best debater and won first place in the literary contest for orations. He also played the clarinet in the school orchestra.

When he was 18 months old, Harold had learned the alphabet from alphabet blocks. He could tell time when he was 2. He taught himself to read, and when he had reached the age of 4, was able to read fluently from several first grade readers he had not seen before.

He first entered school when he was 6 years old, and was placed in the fourth grade. At the end of the first month, however, he was promoted to the fifth grade at the urgent request of the fourth grade teacher. He finished the year in the fifth grade, but the following September, he entered the seventh grade, skipping the sixth entirely. Since then he has spent a year in each grade.

**Check Up Refunds on
Roads in This County**

In a check-up on refunds paid and due under the provisions of the \$60,000,000 and \$100,000,000 bond issues the state division of highways has reported to the county board that Lake county has been given \$608,088 in refunds prior to March 1 of this year, had none payable on that date and as far as refunds which may become payable as the state bond issue work progresses has \$527,865.33, bringing the total to \$1,135,954.25.

**Aviator Is Added to
Staff of Sheriff of
Lake Co.; His Duties**

Sheriff Lawrence Doolittle last week added an aviator to his personal staff of deputies and in the future is to take advantage of anything aviation can add to the apprehension of criminals or carrying out the routine of his office.

Vernon Ramsey, head of the McMillan-Ramsey Flying Service, located at Waukegan airport, was deputized to complete the dream of the sheriff, who for two years has wanted to place an aviator on his staff.

Ramsey aided the sheriff in locating the five drowning victims at Long Lake recently and ever since then Doolittle has been of the opinion that an airplane could be of real value to the office.

While Ramsey failed in his attempt to locate the bodies it was due to the fact that motor boats, towing drag nets and grappling hooks, had stirred up the mud so that he could not see the bottom of the lake. He had been able to see the bottom of the other lakes he crossed going out there.

Next time there is a drowning, and especially the coming season, I will keep all boats out until you can look things over and then we can get the bodies out without any effort." The sheriff advised Ramsey.

In addition he thinks the aviator will be of aid in pursuing criminals in cases of big robberies.

"He can pick them up from the air and indicate to the squads following where they are going," the sheriff explained.

Ramsey holds a commercial license and flies a Stinson-Detroiter monoplane with a Wright motor. The ship cost in the neighborhood of \$9,000 and is licensed.

**Start Work on Second
9 Holes, Libertyville**

The first work on the building of the second nine holes at the Libertyville Country Club was started last week, as a result of the meeting of the members a few days previously, at which time the plan of the special committee for the financing of the project was ratified.
