

### MONTHLY REPORT OF SUBURBAN BUILDING

#### Also Survey of Gains and Losses First Eight Months of Year Given

Building in 40 Chicago suburbs for the first two-thirds of 1929 amounted to \$51,949,245, according to a survey just completed by S. W. Straus & Co. In the eight months comparison the following suburbs indicated gains: Blue Island 34 per cent, Lake Forest 46 per cent and North Chicago 180 per cent. The total was a loss of 32 per cent compared with the same period last year.

The following suburbs made gains in August-August comparison: Chicago Heights 20 per cent, Downers Grove 18 per cent, Elmhurst 6 per cent, Geneva 58 per cent, Glencoe 12 per cent, Highland Park 219 per cent, Joliet 1 per cent, La Grange 117 per cent, Libertyville 293 per cent, Niles Center 193 per cent, North Chicago 58 per cent, West Chicago 16 per cent, Wilmette 25 per cent and Hammond 49 per cent.

Comparison of the August figures with July of this year indicated the following gains: Batavia 1771 per cent, Calumet City 126 per cent, Chicago Heights 270 per cent, Clarendon Hills 261 per cent, Downers Grove 18 per cent, Elmhurst 54 per cent, Elmwood Park 74 per cent, Forest Park 34 per cent, Geneva 11 per cent, Harvey 34 per cent, Highland Park 17 per cent, Kenilworth 54 per cent, Libertyville 165 per cent, Niles Center 73 per cent, North Chicago 22 per cent, Park Ridge 10 per cent, Riverdale 1563 per cent, River Forest 10 per cent, St. Charles 426 per cent, Waukegan 3 per cent, Westchester 80 per cent, West Chicago 2234 per cent and Hammond 35 per cent. It is noted that the largest percentages in gains were made in towns reporting small volumes.

### H. P. Cricket Club Is Winner Game With Lake Forest Sunday

Revenge was sweet to the Highland Park cricket eleven, who overwhelmed the Lake Forest Cricket club on Sunday last, to even a defeat sustained at its hands earlier in the year, at Lake Forest.

Highland Park won the toss and put the visitors into bat first. The deadly bowling of Newitt and Foster dismissed the side for 42 in an hour, every wicket being clean bowled.

After the tea interval, Captain Foster and Sharpe (two old Lake Forest players) opened the innings for Highland Park, and passed the Lake Forest score with the wickets intact, the score reaching 48 before Foster was run out. Every batsman for Highland Park scored, and the score was brought to 175 before the last man was dismissed. Newitt distinguished himself with the best bowling average and highest score (38) of the day. The game was Highland Park's most decisive win and Lake Forest's worst defeat of the season. It was the sixth time Highland Park batsmen have compiled more than 100 runs. Only one team has scored 100 runs against them.

The final home game of the year at Highland Park will be played on Sunday next, when the Lincoln Park Argyle team will attempt to make up for their earlier defeat.
