Opening Game of H. S. Football Season at Highland Park on Saturday

Deerfield-Shields fighting football team is all primed and ready for the first tilt of the season Saturday of this week, when they will play the Waukegan high school team on the Deerfield-Shields athletic field on Park avenue, Highland Park.

Coach Peel has the local team fairly well hammered into condition for the opening game, but a hard battle is expected, especially when it is recalled that Waukegan defeated Roosevelt, 12 to 0, last Saturday.

Heavier Team

This year's team at Deerfield-Shields is believed to be a much different fighting machine than the team which Waukegan defeated last season, 6 to 0. The local team this year has a much heavier line and a faster backfield than last year, according to reports from the practice field and is also said to be better balanced than its predecessor.

More boys are out for football at Deerfield this season than in any previous year, so that there are more candidates for each position in the team. Competition is keen for all places on the field and in several instances it is understood there will be some close decisions in filling the positions. Most of the substitutes also are said to be good material, so that Coach Peel has a good reserve force to fall back on when necessary.
