**Is Asking Refund of
Small Trial Expenses**

Expenses incurred prosecuting former Gov. Len Small in connection with his indictment for his alleged misappropriation of state funds during his term as state treasurer will be sought by Sangamon county, according to a statement made there Monday by State's Attorney Wm. F. Fullenwider. The sum of \$25,000 is to be asked.

In his statement Fullenwider recalls the fact that the hearing was shifted to Waukegan and that Lake county was paid \$17,500 to cover its expense. The money was paid out of the Sangamon county treasury. Small was indicted, arrested and arraigned in Springfield.

As it is not possible to maintain a suit against the state, the county will make application for reimbursement to the state court of claims.
