Personal Element Is Big Factor in Driving

The biggest factor in safe driving is the personal element and this must be realized before any substantial progress is made in the direction of safety on the streets and highways, according to a bulletin issued by the accident prevention department of the Chicago Motor club, which goes on to say:

"We may legislate until we are blue in the face; we may plaster the land with safety signals; we may post traffic officers at every corner, crossing and cowpath in the republic, but accidents on the highways will persist in large numbers until we take full advantage of our knowledge that the biggest factor in safe driving is the personal element."

"That is to say, we have got to keep everlastingly dinning into the mind of the mooring public that every driver carries his life and the lives of others on the turn of his steering wheel and the pressure of his brake pedal."
