## Open Air Nursery School Reopens Oct. 7

The Open Air Nursery school is a pre-kindergarten school for normal children between the ages of 20 months and five years. It is a type of school in which very young children develop their physical, emotional and mental capacities most advantageously, through supervised play and proper daily routine.

The children are out of doors constantly, except in inclement weather. If the weather permits they not only play, but eat and sleep in the open. Low swings, a see-saw, junglegym, slide and sandbox are at their disposal, as well as material for educative play. Rhythm, music and stories are a part of each day's program. Emphasis is placed on encouraging the child to attend as much as possible to his physical needs. At 12 o'clock lunch is served, and the occasion (Continued on Page 50)

The south entrance to the Highland Park hospital has been greatly beautified by the erection of some handsome stone steps leading to the main entrance.

This was made possible by the generosity of the Garden club of Highland Park for the year 1921 and a copy of their letter which they have just sent to the Highland Park hospital board of managers, follows:

It is with great satisfaction that we turn over to you—president of Highland Park hospital board of managers—a check for \$315.97, a gift from the Garden club of Highland Park.

When the club disbanded in April, 1921, it was voted to give the funds remaining in the treasury to the Highland Park hospital whenever the board desired to use this amount for a specified purpose.

Your board has now requested that this gift be applied towards the payment of the new stone steps and platform at the entrance to the hospital. Therefore, the committee holding this trust fund is glad to send to you the check for that purpose with the request that a marker be placed upon the steps reading as follows:

"These steps are a gift to the Highland Park hospital from the members of the Garden club of Highland Park of the year 1921."

### Different Director for Each Play Is Plan; Other Features; Coming Plays

Regardless of possible changes of policy, however, the purpose of the organization remains the same. That purpose is, briefly, to produce good plays intelligently and intelligibly at an admission price which the average of the community can afford to pay, and it is through adherence to that purpose in the past the guild owes its present unique position in the activities of the north shore of Chicago.

#### Change of Policy

A change in guild policy which is almost drastic is in connection with the direction of the actors and actresses of the several plays of the season.
