The funeral will take place at two o'clock, Friday afternoon, at the Zion Lutheran church of Highwood, the Rev. Henry G. Hedlund officiating.

Mrs. Benson was an ardent worker and member of the Zion Congregation and her passing leaves a great void in the hearts of friends.
