Attend Training Conference
Mr. Myron C. Rybolt and Mr. Carl McManus, Boy Scout executive and assistant from the North Shore area council, attended the scout executive training conference for region seven at the Edgewater Beach hotel last week. Leaders from the four states of Wisconsin, Indiana, Michigan and Illinois gathered in a four-day session to study and discuss the many things concerning their work. The theme of the conference study was this: "The growth of the executive board, of the council committees, of the volunteer leaders, and of the scout executive will result in growth in boys."

Several important new things were announced and discussed. The younger boy program for boys from 9 to 12 years old, which has been developing for several years is now ready to be tried out. Soon experimental stations will be set up throughout the country. It is hoped that the North Shore Area council might get one of these stations. The new five-year program of the Boy Scouts of America, including the ten-million-dollar fund is in the process of being promoted. A fine regional sea scout training ship is being bought for the training of sea scouts and leaders in this region. This will mean a growth in region seven's sea scout program.

In discussing the new registration fee for adult scout leaders or scouters, Dr. George Fisher, deputy chief scout executive, stressed the point that "The spiritual side is far more important than the economic side." "At registration" the men should not only pay the fee but every man recommit himself to the oath and law.

The whole conference proved very successful. It was an inspiration and training that will be of great value to the field. The conference was conducted under the leadership of the regional staff of the National Boy Scout council. Mr. Walter Kiplinger, region seven scout executive, was in charge.

Expect Scouts to Be Gentlemen

Too often criticisms are heard of scouts not behaving properly while traveling in public vehicles. The excitement of the minute makes them talk loud, run up and down the cars, behave as if they were wild animals just broken loose from the zoo.

Sometimes this behavior is due to nervous excitement. Very often, however, it is the boys' instinct to show off. Sometimes it is because they think people like to see a group of real live boys. As a matter of fact, people generally do. But the real liveliness may sometimes become nothing but an impertinent nuisance and nobody ever admires that.

Naturally it goes without saying that no scout will remain in his seat if a lady or elderly man is standing.

But there are many ways of showing courtesy. Refrain from too loud talking, singing and other noises. Keep in your seats and don't run all over the place. When getting off and on don't crowd, do everything as quietly as possible.

And then on the hike proper, if you find a sign that says "Keep Off," or "Private," or "No Trespassing," it means "Keep Off," "Private," and "No Trespassing." Likewise you will remember that a gate is of no value if it isn't closed, that the owner of a piece of property has a reason for putting a fence around it, that cultivated fields aren't public property and private trees not for everybody's rifling.

By using common sense you can keep away from doing things which the public may consider a breach of good behavior.

Last but by no means least remember the axe. The scout axe is a deadly weapon if not rightly used. It is a weapon by which not only other individuals may be injured but by which other living objects such as trees and shrubs may be killed and the good name of scouting ruined. Unless you can use your axe for purposes intended better by far that you leave it at home. Carve your initials in sand until you are sufficient noteworthy to have a sculptor carve it in stone, or a printer set it in type or electric lamps.
