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# League of Women Voters Keeps Check on General Assembly

Another check-up on voting records of members of the 1929 general assembly has just been made, this time from the woman's point of view. The report is printed in the current issue of The Illinois Voter, official publication of the Illinois League of Women Voters.

In the publication, votes of every state representative and senator on 18 bills regarded as of paramount importance by the league, are listed. "The list," says an editorial note, "will be invaluable in appraising their (legislators') qualifications before the spring primary."

Votes on the women's jury bills, the office-group ballot bills and the state distributive school fund bill, for which the league was especially active in its lobbying, are stressed in the report; but votes are also recorded on other measures, including the old age pension bill, the gasoline tax, the several measures aimed at prohibition laws, the revenue amendment, and others.

The league was successful this year in obtaining passage of the woman on juries bills, with the qualifications that before they become effective they must be approved at a statewide referendum. The bill to increase the state distributive school fund was partially successful. The bill to discard the party ballet, now in use in Illinois, in favor of the group ballot, by which all candidates for a particular office are grouped under a heading of that office rather under the party affiliation, was beaten.

Accompanying the report is an article by Edith Rockwood, the league's representative at Springfield while the legislature is in session, summarizing important laws passed by the last assembly.

## Dedicate Memorial Bridge, Belvidere

Thousands of Belividere and Boone county residents, augmented by many hundreds from nearby cities, last week joined in the dedication of Belvidere's fine new Memorial bridge, which joins the business sections of the two sides of the city into a united Belvidere.

Speeches were delivered by Rep. Ruth Hanna McCormick, Illinois congresswoman-at-large, and Rep. John T. Buckbee of the Tenth congressional district. Both praised the enterprise of Belvidere in erecting a bridge which for beauty is unsurpassed in northern Illinois.

-Music by the Belvidere high school band, national "Class B" champions, was one of the features of the program. Numerous other numbers made up a splendid program. A parade of automobiles followed the dedication as the bridge was officially declared open.

The bridge, which is a memorial to Belvidere's World War Veterans, was then closed for a four-day period in courtesy to the Belvidere Post of the American Legion, which is staging a big carnival in connection with the bridge opening. Proceeds of the carnival will be used to send the post's drum and bugle corps to the National Legion convention at Louisville, Ky., late his month.

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
