FOUR-YEAR TERM

New Illinois Law Provides for Longer Tenure of Office Hereafter

Supervisors of Lake county will be elected for four year terms instead of two under legislation enacted at the Women Usually Fail last session of the state assembly. The idea behind the establishment of a longer term for the county board members is that election expenses will be cut, as elections will be less frequent.

Power to Force Repairs Power to force township highway commissioners to make necessary repair on roads in their jurisdictions under penalty of fines or even removal from office is granted to the county superintendent of highways under legislation enacted by the last general assembly.

Three land owners, according to this new law, may petition the township highway commissioner in writing to make repairs they deem necessary. The commissioner is given ten days after such notice is received to make repairs.

At the expiration of that period, the land owners may petition the county superintendent of highways to force action.

The county superintendent shall set a date for a hearing to be held not less than ten nor more than twenty days after the notices of the hearing have been posted in the five most public places in the vicinity of the road in question.
