

### MEMORIAL SESSION OF N. S. ART LEAGUE

Ravinia School, Oct. 18; Exhibit  
of Work of Two Prominent  
Deceased Members

The opening meeting of the season of the North Shore Art league, to be held in the Ravinia school Friday evening, Oct. 18, will be in the nature of a memorial to Lionel Robertson

and Lawrence Buck, who were prominent members of the league.

Mr. Robertson died last spring and Mr. Buck during the summer. The two were close friends, and at the October meeting last year, at Mr. Robertson's home in Ravinia, Mr. Buck was the speaker.

#### Exhibit of Their Work

A special exhibit of their technical work is planned for this year's October meeting, at which time there will also be an exhibit of the summer work of the Ravinia sketch class.

This meeting and exhibit will be

held at the Ravinia school. Plans were made at the first board meeting of the season held Thursday evening, September 19, at Community house, Winnetka, Mrs. Frank Peyraud, chairman of the program committee, will be in charge of the first league meeting.

The league plans to have again this year the series of evening art classes which have been so popular with the league members for the past five years, and have again secured George Oberteufer as the instructor. He is one of the most popular of the Art

institute teachers, his classes always being overcrowded and the league officers feel themselves fortunate to have obtained his services for another year.

#### Meet Twice Weekly

Formerly the series of classes has come after Christmas but this year another group will be given before the holidays. They are to be given two evenings, late each week, the class working alone one night, and Mr. Oberteufer giving criticism the next evening. They will begin the first week in November, six weeks of classes coming before Christmas and twelve weeks after, with an intermission of about three weeks at the holidays.

The work will be portrait study from a costumed model and both beginners and advanced pupils are welcomed. The class is limited to thirty pupils and only members of the North Shore Art league are permitted to enroll.

#### Substitute Group Competition for Honor Roll Plan

Instead of having an honor roll each six weeks as has been the custom, Deerfield-Shields starting this year will have "home room" competition for honors, with perhaps a reading in assembly of the names of the students who are highest in their studies.

In the new system each home room is to compete with the other forty-three for the highest standing. There will be four awards made each six weeks period for the best home room.

The first contest will be for the home room having the highest average standing in grades.

In the second contest an award is made for the room having the fewest failures.

The third competition will be to determine which home room has made the greatest improvement over the previous six weeks.

The fourth award will be given the home room whose students have made the best attendance during the preceding six weeks period.

#### Good Outlook for High School Band

Although the Deerfield-Shields high school band lost the largest number of boys this year since the beginning of its existence in 1916, the prospects for the new 1929 band are very good, it is reported.

"The new boys and the remainder of the old members are showing more marked school spirit, according to Director Bolle.

This year the band is practicing marching in the form of a letter, which is something they have never attempted before. As yet the marching is not very well developed, as not enough boys have appeared for practice. Fifty-four boys are required to make the letter.
