Women Voters Open Membership Drive

The annual membership drive of the Highland Park League of Women voters begins this week, and it is hoped that every home in Highland Park will be reached. The drive organization of precinct chairmen and block captains is a most effective one, and especially valuable at election time in getting out the vote, which so vitally concerns our health and welfare. Much of the progress made in the last nine years along these lines may be directly traced to the efforts of the League of Women voters. Political consciousness has been aroused, and women are being educated to be good citizens, and thereby, better wives and mothers. This is done by means of monthly meetings, and smaller study groups, by citizenship school, radio programs, and very well prepared literature.

The League of Women voters is absolutely non-partisan, and women of all parties are cordially welcomed. It gives disinterested information on parties, candidates, and measures, and collects facts women should know about government. It is a real factor in putting through desirable legislation. Every wide-awake woman should belong. Now that she has the vote, she should use it, and use it intelligently.

The membership dues include "The Illinois Voter," the League's monthly magazine which contains much valuable information. The appeal filed in the supreme court is from a decision of the circuit court of Cook county upholding the increased rates on insurance. Unless briefs and arguments are filed soon, the case will be carried over for presentation to the December term, making a final decision improbable before the February term of court.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that bids will be received for the construction of a connected system of vitrified, salt-glazed, hub and spigot tile pipe, storm drains and corrugated iron pipe, outlet drain with the necessary manholes, inlet basins, junctions for house connections and other improvements in Taylor Avenue, in the City of Highland Park, Lake County, Illinois, as a whole in accordance with the ordinance therefor.

Said bids will be received by the Board of Local Improvements at its office in the City Hall, Highland Park, Illinois, until 7:45 P.M. on the 21st day of October, 1929, at which time and place they will be publicly opened and read.

The specifications and blank proposals will be furnished at the office of the Board of Local Improvements in the City Hall of said City.

The contractor will be paid in bonds, which bonds will draw interest at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum.
