As none of the furnishings have yet been arranged for, there are other things which would also be acceptable. A large outside fountain might be placed between the city hall and the site of the new library building. Many other articles, less costly, could be considered.

URGES PRECAUTIONS AGAINST FIRE LOSS

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America suffer a horrible death in the midst of flames, and to this misery must be added the long train of injuries that do not result fatally. Although many office buildings have been made comparatively safe, such is not the case with American homes. As a matter of fact, 66% per cent of deaths from fire occur in homes and worst of all, 31 per cent of these deaths are among children under ten years of age. Parents would do well to consider if the lives of their own children are adequately safeguarded.

Again, if any one questions the urgent need of fire prevention, let him consider the economic loss wrought by fire. The value of property destroyed annually totals the huge sum of almost a half-billion dollars. This material is simply burned out of existence. No magician can wave his wand and bring it back for useful purposes. In other words the dollars that die when fire destroys property are actually taken from the pocketbook of every citizen of the community.

Fire chiefs throughout America are doing everything within their power to reduce their fire losses and take great pride in their records. Your fire chief is no exception. Our city will soon receive a lower rating from the underwriters due to splendid improvements now being made by our city council. When a city of our size receives a lower rating it means that every citizen will receive a benefit in the cost of insurance. Think what a saving this will mean to every property owner in our city.

We should make this week a week of inspection in our homes. Look over your chimneys; see that they are in good shape; see that flue pipes are cemented in chimney and are not pitted with rust holes. See that ashes are stored in metal containers. Use standard electrical equipment. Store all inflammable liquids in a safe place, away from heat. Store oil mops and oil rags in metal containers. Don't let Fire Prevention week go by without doing your share to increase your safety against fire.
