Mrs. Pauline Hanson Passes Away Oct. 3

Pauline Hansen was born in Vittenburg, Germany, May 29, 1859, and died at her home, 126 S. Green Bay road, at 1:40 Thursday morning, October 3, 1929. She attained the age of 70 years, 4 months and 4 days.

When she was 9 years of age she came to America with her parents who at that time settled at Sugar Island, Wisconsin. She gained her early training and grew to young womanhood in that vicinity. In the year 1880 she united in marriage with Philip Hansen. To their union were born seven children, all of whom are still living, but one who died in infancy. After the marriage of Mr. and Mrs. Hansen, they moved to Oconomowoc, Wisconsin, where they lived for a period of nearly 24 years. Mr. Hansen preceded his wife in death in 1924. Four years later Mrs. Hansen came to Highland Park to make her home with her children. During the 21 years that she lived here, she has made many friends, and her influence always counted on the side of the worthwhile things of the community. Mrs. Hansen has always been keenly interested in the work of the Christian church, and has practically been a life long member of the same. During the time that she has been in Highland Park, she has been identified with the work of the Bethany Evangelical church and recently became a member of the same.

Mrs. Hansen was a very loyal and devoted mother, she was willing to make any kind of sacrifice for the welfare of her family. It was her keen desire that she might live till her children had grown to manhood and womanhood. Although she longed keenly for the privilege of living with her loved ones, yet many of her desires having been fulfilled, she was content to go. For the past three years she has faced ill health, and has been seriously ill during the past 14 months.

She leaves to mourn her six children, Edward of Oconomowoc, Leonora Warburton, of Buffalo, Wyoming, Mable Duffy, Victoria Iverson, Miss Edith and Henry, all of Highland Park. Also eight grandchildren, two sisters and five brothers.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon, October 5, 1:30, at the home, 2:00 p. m., at the Bethany church. H. F. Siemsen, officiated.

Grand Jury Returns 39 True Bills; Three Charges of Murder

Thirty-eight defendants were indicted Monday by the October grand jury that investigated 41 cases and voted 39 true bills.

Three men, George Sullivan, Oscar Tooles, and Albert Mihan were indicted for murder. Sullivan stands accused of slaying his foster sister, Mrs. Leonora McGraw of Highland Park; Mihan is charged with shooting down Arthur Jadrach of North Chicago; and Tooles with slaying his sweetheart, Minnie Harris in Waukegan.

The defendants are to be arraigned Monday morning before Circuit Judge Claire C. Edwards. Bail was refused Mihan and Sullivan who are in the county jail, when bonds were set today. Tooles is a fugitive.

E. L. Davis was foreman of the jury and Justice Harold Tallett, of North Chicago, was clerk.

The grand jury set a record in finishing in a day for the October term as it covers all the crimes for the late spring and summer.

Nine Highwood men accused by Eloise Byford, 15-year-old Highland Park girl, were indicted, as was Raymond Hitchcock, Lake Bluff youth, who is accused of breaking into a store and home there. Four indictments were returned against Hitchcock.

He was hurried to the Highland Park hospital, where he remained until Tuesday night when he was able to return home.
