

Opening Meeting of Women Voters Oct. 16

The first yearly meeting of the Highland Park League of Women voters will be held next Wednesday, October 16, in the Arts room of Ravinia school. Luncheon will be served promptly at 12:30, and reservations should be made early by calling H. P. 1880, or 1541, as a large attendance is expected.

One of the finest speakers of the State League is to talk after lunch Mrs. Laura Lunde, whose enthusiasm is most infectious, and who will be remembered by many for her stirring addresses last year. She will review the year's legislative program, and discuss in general the purposes and methods of the league.

The Highland Park league's membership drive is now in progress. In these days of wider interests for women, representation in a growing organization such as the league, with its educational possibilities, and research facilities should be almost a necessity. Women who now regard the vote with indifference, may learn to use it in such a way that it becomes a real power in improving living conditions, and in raising the whole political situation to a higher level. The league strives to educate by giving absolutely impartial information and women of every party are eligible for membership. This membership includes "The Woman Voter," which tells of the league's activities nationally as well as locally, and gives a very good idea of the extent and importance of league work. Anyone who has not already joined the Highland Park league and who wishes to become a member, may do so at this first meeting, and will be cordially welcomed.

The board lesson series sent out by the State league are to be used this year, creating an interesting study course within the board.
