

FARM YOUTH CAUGHT IN BINDER IS DEAD

Elvin Kesler, 17, Victim of Peculiar Accident Near Lake Zurich

Caught by the throat between a blade on the reel and the cutter bar on a reaper after he had been thrown from the driver's seat when the horses bolted, Elvin Kesler, 16-year-old son of Joseph Kesler, was choked to death in a field on his father's farm five miles east of Lake Zurich, at 3:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon of last week.

Although the father and farm hand were stacking grain in the same field the accident happened without their knowledge. The father found the body of the youth caught in the machine when he walked across the field intending to assist his son whom he believed was working on the machine.

Dragged for Many Feet

Indications are that the youth fell from the seat of the machine into the path of the cutter bar and was drawn into the reaper before he could save himself. With the blade of the reel pressing down on the throat the body was dragged for more than 75 feet by the frightened horses.

The body of the victim was removed to the farm home, where an inquest was held by Dr. J. L. Taylor, county coroner, in the evening. The body was then taken to an undertaking establishment at Des Plaines.

Was the Only Son

The youth was the only son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Kesler. Another son, Marvin, died last spring. He is survived by six sisters, however. They are: Helen, Ethel, Florence, Alice, Marion and Evelyn.

The deceased was born in Chicago and has lived on the farm near Lake Zurich with his parents since they assumed occupancy four years ago.

Course in Air Motors Given in High School

"Airplane Motors" is the name of a course being given in Colorado Springs high school this year.

Eighteen weeks are to be devoted to this course, which consist of four hours work every Saturday at the factory. Here the students assemble motors of various types.

Along with the mechanical part of the course, lectures are given one afternoon each week of an hour and one-half in length. The students taking this course not only receive a full high school credit, but it enables them to qualify more easily as a licensed airplane mechanic.

There is a tuition charge for this course of five dollars per month in addition to the cost of a textbook which the student must provide himself.

Already there have been nineteen students signed up for this new course in air motors.

Flying Legion Is New Organization Chartered

The Flying Legion of America was granted articles of incorporation by the secretary of state's office at Springfield last week.

The object of the society is to promote aviation to aid in enactment of laws by states and congress in the regulation of flying and to encourage promotion of aviation and friendly relations between the United States and other nations on the North and South American continents.
