**Mackie Girls Likely  
to Be Deported Soon**

Probably not even a presidential dispensation can prevent the deportation of Pearl and Marie Mackie, former Waukegan girls, according to Congressman Carl Chindblom who visited Waukegan Saturday to speak at the dedication of the Edison Square branch post office.

"If it will aid them in adjusting their business affairs, I will gladly attempt to secure them another postponement of the deportation date, but

further efforts to prevent deportation will be fruitless," Chindblom stated today.

Since the entry of the Mackie girls into this country was a technical violation of the immigration laws, the deportation must be made by the department of labor, Congressman Chindblom states. The congressman has made a thorough study of the case in an attempt to enable the Mackie girls to remain in this country. They are now employed in Milwaukee.
