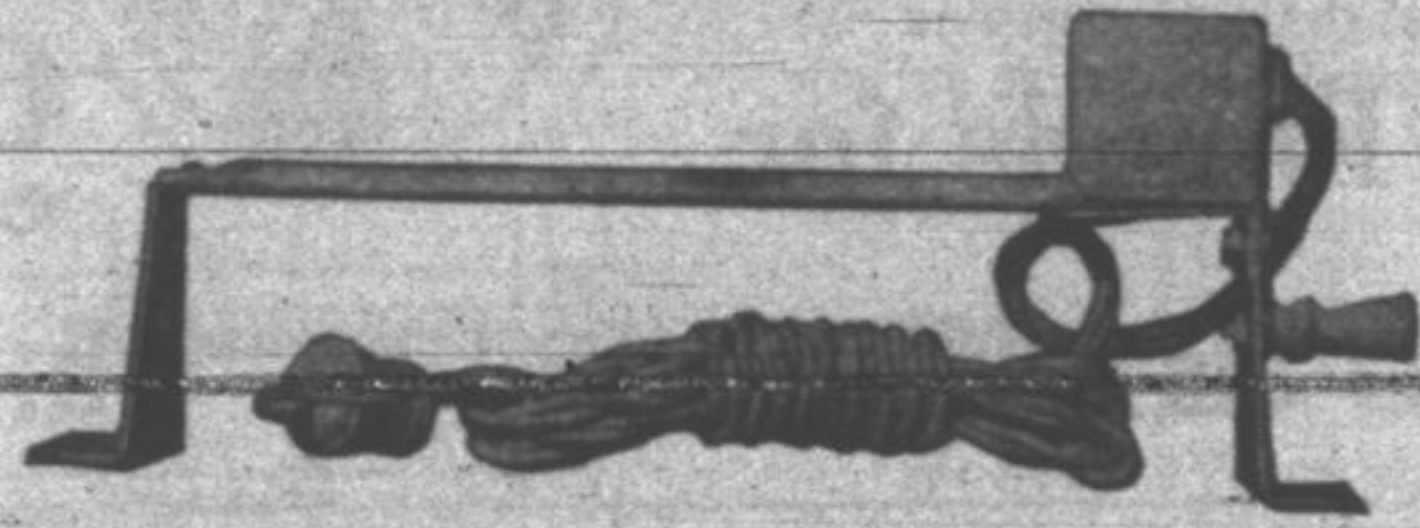

### Dr. Martin Appointed to Staff of Museum

The appointment of Dr. Paul S. Martin, of Chicago, as a member of the staff of the department of anthropology at Field Museum of Natural History as announced today by Stephen C. Simms, director of the museum. Dr. Martin is now at the museum, where he has assumed his duties as assistant curator in charge of North American archaeology. His first work will be a revision of the museum's collections representing the archaeology of North American Indian tribes, a project that will require a long period for completion.

Dr. Martin is a graduate of the University of Chicago, where he earned his doctorate in philosophy. He was formerly a member of the staff of the Public Museum at Milwaukee, Wis., and the Colorado State Museum at Denver. He has performed several years of expeditionary and research work on the ancient mound builders' sites in Illinois and Wisconsin, on sites of ancient Indian cultures in Arizona and New Mexico. He is the author of several scientific reports on the archaeology of the southwestern region of the United States, and on Maya civilization in Yucatan.

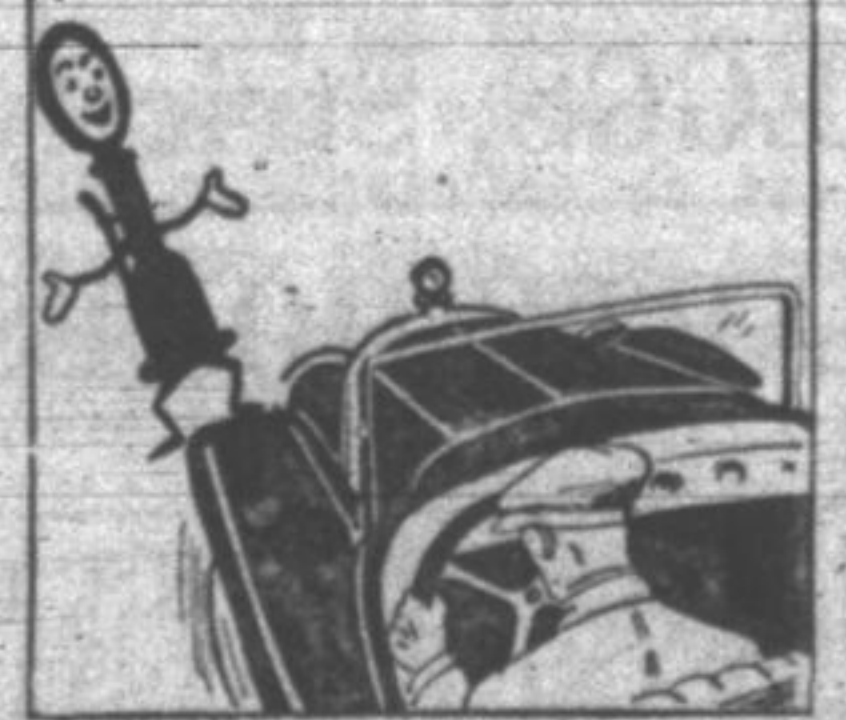
