JEWELS ARE STOLEN FROM INSULL HOME

\$12,000 Burglary Reported to Police; Second Story Job; Gems Insured

Every effort is being made by the Highland Park police to obtain trace of the burglars who last week entered the second story of the residence of Martin Insull, 428 N. Sheriden road, Highland Park, and stole jewelry estimated in value exceeding \$12,000. The property was covered by insurance, the police report.

The burglary took place, as nearly as can be learned by the police, while the family was at dinner on the evening of October 8, but at the request of the Insulls news of the robbery was not made public until later in the week.
