## JEWELS ARE STOLEN FROM INSULL HOME

### \$12,000 Burglary Reported to Police; Second Story Job; Gems Insured

Every effort is being made by the Highland Park police to obtain trace of the burglars who last week entered the second story of the residence of Martin Insull, 428 N. Sheridan road, Highland Park, and stole jewelry estimated in value exceeding \$12,000. The property was covered by insurance, the police report.

The burglary took place, as nearly as can be learned by the police, while the family was at dinner on the evening of October 8, but at the request of the Insulls news of the robbery was not made public until later in the week.

### Second Story Job

The thief gained access to second story room at the southwest corner of the house by climbing a downpipe to the top of the window of the first floor. Traces of mud on the iron framework of an awning above this window indicated that the man had stood thereon while raising the screen and window of the bedroom in which the jewelry was taken.

It has been reported to the police that a woman was seen seated in an automobile parked near the Insull home about 6:30 o'clock on the evening of the robbery and that the car was driven away before 7 o'clock. This may or may not prove a clue to the burglary, the police say, but as far as learned nobody had visited any of the neighboring homes about that time leaving a car parked on the street.
