

H. P. HOSPITAL IS IN APPROVED LIST

Local Institution Gets O. K. from Clinical Congress of College of Surgeons

The Highland Park hospital was signally honored this week by the American College of Surgeons when it was included in a group of four hospitals in Lake county in the list of hospitals approved by the Clinical Congress of the A. C. S., in session in Chicago. The four hospitals in this county are listed in the approved list as follows:

In Waukegan the Victory Memorial hospital, operated by a board of trustees.

Highland Park hospital at Highland Park, operated by a board of directors.

Great Lakes naval hospital operated by the U. S. Navy.

United States Veterans hospital at North Chicago operated by the Veterans bureau of the Government.

Requirements

The requirements for hospitals included in the approved list are:

(1) A modern physical plant, free from hazards, with a competent governing body.

(2) An efficient, chief executive officer or superintendent with a competent personnel.

(3) An organized medical staff of qualified physicians and surgeons who hold regular meetings to review and evaluate the professional work of the hospital.

(4) A thorough system for recording conditions, treatment and progress of each patient.

(5) Acceptable diagnostic and therapeutic facilities.

(6) Definite evidence that the staff members are opposed to fee-splitting or payment of commissions by surgeons for patients referred to them.

Imposes Stiff Fines for Reckless Driving

Judge Charles Glass of Highwood does not sympathize with drunken drivers, he says, and points to recent heavy fines imposed. He reports that Joe Dawson paid a heavy fine the second time on a charge of driving through Highwood while intoxicated. On the first offense, Justice Glass says, Dawson was fined \$100 and costs, and when he reappeared on a second charge the fine assessed was \$200. By imposing heavy fines in such cases the justice of the peace hopes to help reduce the number of accidents in the community.

What the school is now doing:

1. Tutoring in all subjects from the 1st grade through high school.
2. Having classes in the Touch System typing and short hand.
3. Having special classes in writing. (Pupils may earn diplomas).
4. Braille is also being taught.

Forty pupils from the Elm Place school finished the typing course last summer, they were pupils from the 3rd, 4th, 5th, 6th and 7th grades. They all reached an average speed of 35 words a minute.
