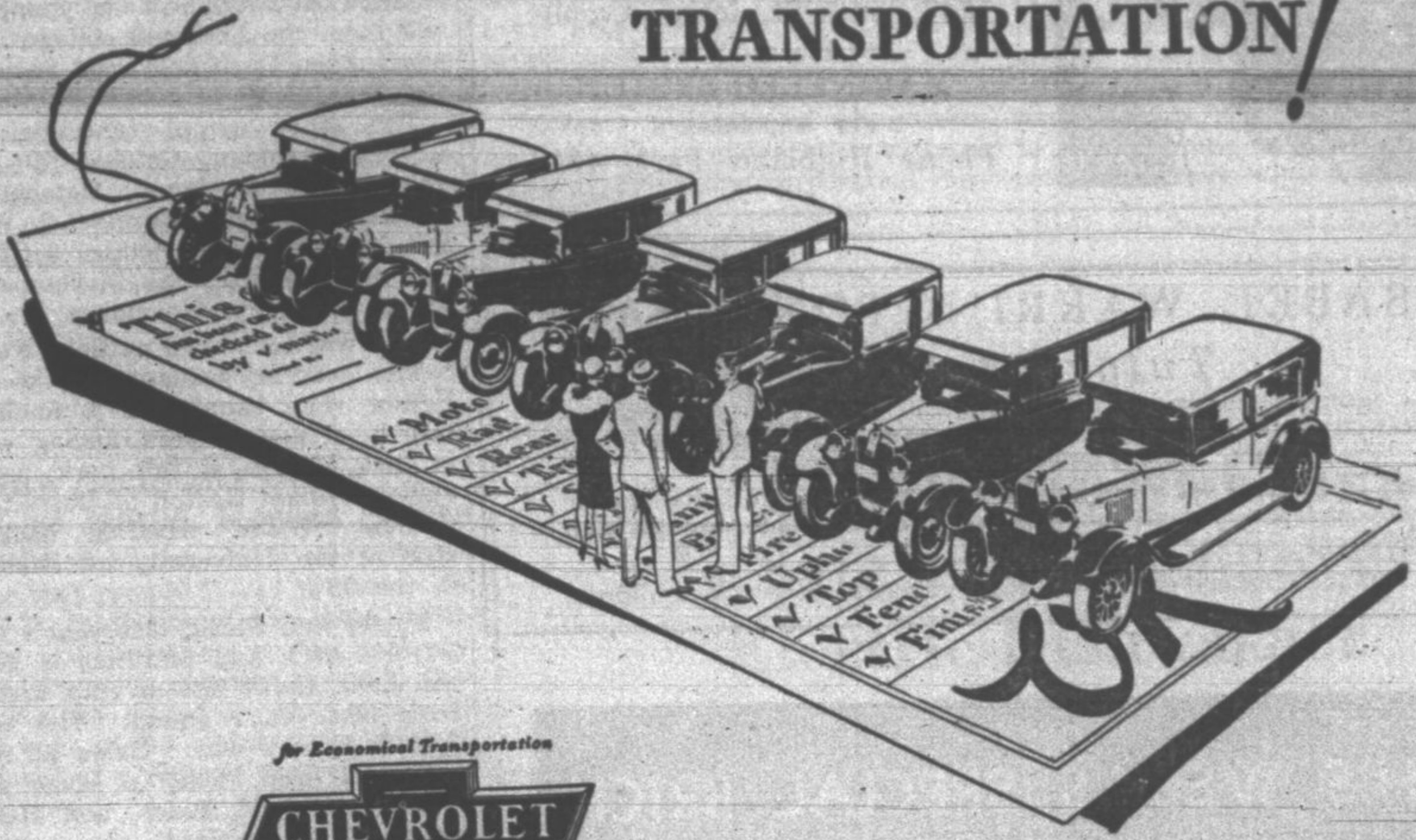
First Buffalo Kill in Years
