so this plan is now in force: a circle is made of 8 or 10 scouts who are given a sheet having the printed laws on it. The leader in the center selects a scout to give the first law and the others, knowing that they will be called on for the next one in order, proceed to get busy studying that one so that it can be given without prompting. The next time around the circle each scout gets a different law which he must learn. A few evenings of this drill makes some snap to giving the laws. How well each one does is recorded in the patrol score, and special records can be given to add to the interest. If a scout knows the law will he not live it better?

The plan for advanced camp will have to be postponed indefinitely on account of the many duties of the older scouts and the press of other scouting events that are scheduled. But the plans will keep so they will be put on the shelf for another occasion. The above stated hike will be the regular one for this month.

Public Notice is hereby given that the County Court of Lake County, Illinois, has rendered judgment for a special assessment upon property benefited by the following improvement: A special assessment to pay the cost of the construction of a reinforced concrete pavement and concrete combined curb and gutter with the necessary drainage and other improvements in Green Bay Road from and connecting with the existing brick pavement in Green Bay Road at Edgewood Road South to the Southern limits of the City of Highland Park, Lake County, Illinois, as will more fully appear from the certified copy of the judgment on file in my office.
