Palmer Christian, one of the most renowned organists in the world, will give an organ recital at the Highland Park Presbyterian church next Sunday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock. This musical service is open to all

who desire to attend and the coming of this great artist has been arranged that he may demonstrate his skill as an interpreter of the composers upon the new organ recently installed in the church. Since 1924 Mr. Christian has been connected with the University of Michigan and he is making the week-end journey to Highland Park as the guest of the church.

A detailed program of the organ pieces played during the recital will be distributed to all who come next Sunday afternoon.

This promises to be one of the most delightful musical features in the realm of church music to be heard here this winter, as Mr. Christian is regarded as one of the outstanding artists in this department of musical endeavor, and the fact that he has been secured to appear in the Highland Park Presbyterian church is a matter of gratification to its officers and members and an opportunity for all in the community who are interested in fine music of this character to hear it executed by a player of unsurpassed talent and technique.

## Sarg's Marionettes

**In "Rip Van Winkle,"  
Elm Place Nov. 13th**

Tony Sarg's little wooden-headed troupers are about to make their annual visit, and with them is that droll and unforgettable character Rip Van Winkle from Washington Irving's legend of New Amsterdam.

They will present their puppet version of America's favorite folk-tale at the Elm Place auditorium Wednesday afternoon and evening, Nov. 18.

The story is depicted in seven scenes and during the course of the action there are introduced such odd characters as Nicholas Vedder, the keeper of the inn; Derrick Von Bommel, the village school teacher; Dame Van Winkle, the scolding wife; villagers, musicians and others, not forgetting Rip's faithful dog, Wolf; and the Van Winkle cow.

Life is imparted to the marionettes by means of 500 strings which are manipulated by five puppeteers, headed by Charles E. Searle. The puppets are only two feet in height, but such is the optical illusion that the stage and the doll-actors, appear life-sized.

The marionettes will play in Chicago at the Goodman theater Saturday morning and afternoon, Oct. 26, repeating the performance on Saturday, Nov. 2.
