### Local Eagle Scout to Get Highest Rank at Public Court of Honor

Scout Fred Reichardt of troop 30, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Reichardt, 713 South St. Johns avenue, Highland Park, is to be awarded the highest rank in scouting on this Friday evening, the 25th, at the local city-wide Public Court of Honor held at Elm Place school at 7:30.

Besides earning the twenty-one merit badges required for this Eagle rank, scout Reichardt has produced concrete evidence that he has continued to put in practice the scout oath and law, the motto "Be Prepared" and the "Daily Good Turn." He has also in his continuous service for nearly four years developed and demonstrated the leadership ability. In his troop 33, under the training of Mr. H. R. Smith, scoutmaster, Eagle scout Reichardt has worked up through the ranks and has been a leader as an assistant patrol leader, patrol leader, senior patrol leader and is now junior assistant scoutmaster. He received his Star rank in March 1928 and Life rank in November 1928.

Eagle scout Reichardt has been keenly interested in camping. Besides innumerable overnight hikes, he spent the summer of 1926 at Camp Hastings, in 1927 was at Camp Roosevelt, and this last summer at Camp Ma-Ka-Ja-Wan, the North Shore Area camp. ### SCHUMACHER RESIGNS AS CITY COUNSELLOR

**John Munro Appointed as Corporation Counsel at Meeting of Council**

Resignation of Bowen E. Schumacher as corporation counsel of the city of Highland Park to take effect Nov. 1 was presented to the city council at its regular session Monday evening and was accepted. John Munro was appointed corporation counsel to fill the vacancy at a salary of \$2,000 annually.

Mr. Munro is a son of the late Fayette Munro, former representative, well known attorney, and is a young lawyer of ability with splendid connections, according to Acting Mayor William Reay, who spoke of him in complimentary terms in announcing the appointment.

Mr. Schumacher explained later that his resignation was due to the necessity of devoting more of his attention to other details of his business, but stated that he would keep in touch with the new corporation council in city matters and give such assistance as might be required.
