**Ek Files Writ to Get Rooming House Permit**

E. O. Ek of 916 St. Johns avenue last Friday filed a petition in circuit court for a writ of certiorari against the board of appeals of Highland Park to force that body to reverse its decision regarding the issuance of a permit to Ek for a rooming house.

Ek was refused a permit by Building Commissioner S. D. Morris at the instance of the board on the grounds that rooming houses, such as the one planned by Ek, are not permissible in Class "B" territory, according to the zoning code. It is understood that the city and neighboring property owners plan to fight the case in circuit court.

**Air Pilot Known Here Makes Parachute Leap Saves Mail on Plane**

Pilot Harry Sievers, flying mail from Pittsburgh to Cleveland, risked his life but saved the mail Sunday morning when he leaped from his plane at an altitude of 1,000 feet. Sievers felt the motor go dead, grasped the heavy mail bag under his arm and leaped into the darkness, landing safely when his parachute opened and dropped him to earth near the wreckage of his burning plane.

Mr. Sievers, who is a former Highland Park, is the brother of R. Wilbur and Emory Sievers of Chicago and Mrs. Lester Levin of Chicago. He learned to fly and received his license at the Pal-Waukee field. He has been on this run for the past five months and is the only flyer who has followed this run, to have a perfect record. The course is a very difficult one owing to air conditions which are foggy, and a very hazy country.

He was the first man to try to successfully fly the Adams flying picture. This device has not as yet been put into active service, but it is hoped to develop it in small towns and large cities where there are no landing fields.

Mr. Sievers' safe landing with his parachute entitles him to become a member of the Caterpillar club, an honor which aviators do not seek, of which all who have achieved it are very proud.
