Murray & Terry to Open New Subdivision

Murray & Terry announce the opening of "West View," an unusually high grade subdivision on Bob O'Link road and south of and adjoining the beautiful Curtis M. Kimball grounds and beginning one block west of Green Bay road and Lincoln school.

Samuel S. Isa Will Speak on "Mesopotamia"

Samuel S. Isa, a native of Bagdad will lecture on this very interesting portion of the east, at the West school Saturday evening, Oct. 24. Mr. Isa has studied extensively in colleges of this country, served during the World war with the British and Canadian forces on several North Eastern campaigns, has traveled much in various parts of Europe and has served as a minister and teacher in this country and, for a time, one of the sparsely settled regions of Canada. During his talk Mr. Isa will wear and explain the significance of the various articles of apparel commonly worn in his native country and will show samples of the intricately worked jewelry made and worn by its people.

Irma Johnson Nixon, the instructor of music at the Lincoln and Ridge schools will give a group piano selections from Chopin. Many of our local people, who have heard Mrs. Nixon, realize what a real musical treat this will be.

In addition, Frank Salerno, a nationally known accordion artist will entertain with his piano-accordion. Those who have enjoyed radio concerts will deem it a real pleasure to see and hear this great accordionist in person.

This is the first of a series of programs to be sponsored by the West Ridge Community club and they themselves exceptionally fortunate to be able to obtain three entertainers of this type for their first evening. A cordial invitation is extended to the public.

George Ewart Dies in Valdosta, Ga.

On Sunday evening, Oct. 6, George Douglas Ewart, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Ewart, former residents of Highland Park passed away at the home of his parents in Valdosta, Ga.

He was born the twin of Henry Gordon Ewart on February 8, 1901. Henry Gordon preceded his brother in death April 25, 1921. This sickness gradually impaired his health until a few months ago, when an operation was performed to remove the gland of pressure in the throat. The operation was successful and he rallied, but his heart could not carry the double load, and he passed away.

With his family, George spent his younger days in Cuba, going to Valdosta with them in 1918. During the same year he joined the United States Navy as electrician. Twice he made the eastern and Mediterranean cruise visiting many countries. He was on the west coast at the time of his brother's tragic death.

Besides his parents, he leaves three sisters, Mrs. F. D. Fuller of Balboa Canal Zone, Mrs. A. E. Noeves of White Plains, N. Y., Mrs. T. G. Taylor of Valdosta, three brothers, John Ewart and L. M. Ewart of Columbus, O., and Alvin Ewart of Valdosta.
