

Things to Cook

A very excellent way to use left-over meat and at the same time prepare a very appetizing meal quickly, is to make hot sandwiches. We so often slice our cold meat or grind it to make cold sandwiches but, if you have never made hot sandwiches, you will find them well worth trying.

Two slices of bread may be used, but nicely browned toast makes them very attractive and appetizing. If you have meat that will slice nicely, slices may be placed over the first piece of bread or toast, with some of the gravy over it; then another piece of the bread or toast, more meat on top and some of the gravy over it. Pickles or relishes make a very good accompaniment to any of these sandwiches, even if a salad is served also.

Instead of slicing the meat, it may be cup up and mixed with the gravy, then used between the pieces of toast and on top. I think this method is a little better than slicing the meat, as all the small pieces may be used. The seasonings may vary to make different dishes, and I am giving a few suggestions which I hope will be helpful.

When we have left-over veal, pork, lamb or beef, we usually have some of the gravy left and this may be used. If we have not enough gravy, we may make more by browning flour in melted butter or any other fat desired, stirring until well browned, then adding water in which has been dissolved bouillon cubes or paste, either the vegetable or meal bouillon. Then add the left-over gravy and stir until well blended.

If we use ham, corned beef or tongue for these sandwiches, a nicely seasoned cream sauce may be used, adding a little cut green pepper or pimento, if liked, or a little grated cheese. When ham is used, some sliced hard-cooked eggs make an excellent addition.

If chicken is used, serve it with the gravy if you have it, or with a cream sauce. A few mushrooms may be added, cooking them for a few minutes in the cream sauce or gravy. A small can of mushrooms is a very excellent addition to the emergency shelf, to be used for such purpose.

Another very delicious hot sandwich may be made with chicken giblets, using some of the chicken also, if you have not quite enough of the giblets. I was recently served a Hot Chicken Giblet Sandwich in a very lovely tea room and it made a delicious luncheon.
