

BRIEF NEWS ITEMS

Work on the repairing and reinforcing of the sea wall which protects the Waukegan shore line in front of the Johnson Motor company and the city waterworks was started last week by O. L. Oleson, the Highland Park contractor who received the bid for the job.

Cutting a gaping hole in the roof of the National Tea company at 1419 Washington street, burglars entered the store and ransacked it from end to end, escaping through the back door with \$125 in cash.

Frank Burke, Waukegan, has been re-elected as a member of the board of directors of the Illinois Chamber of Commerce from the fifth district.

The executive committee of the Lake County Farm Bureau followed out the instructions of the board of directors and rehired H. C. Gilkerson, farm adviser, for another three year period beginning December 1, 1929, at its meeting recently.

County Recorder Lew O. Brockway, who has been seriously ill at his home is reported to be improving. He was threatened with bronchial pneumonia and has been under the care of a trained nurse. He will probably not be able to return to his duties at the house for several weeks.

The next step in the condemnation proceedings to acquire a site for the new Waukegan, Ill., postoffice will be the appraisal of the property and the calling of a hearing before the United States district court in Chicago, at which the property owners will be represented.

First services will be held in the new Immaculate Conception church,

Waukegan, on Sunday, December 8, according to an announcement made in the Sunday morning services by Rev. F. J. Shea, pastor of the church.

Progress on the extension which the North Shore line is building in order to relieve the traffic congestion at the corner of Washington and Genesee streets, Waukegan, by routing limited trains to the Utica street terminal by way of Water street, indicates that the work will be completed within the 30 days predicted by the officials of the company.

Carnation Inka Matador, owned by H. J. Meirkord of Linn, Kan.,* was judged Junior National Champion in the same class.

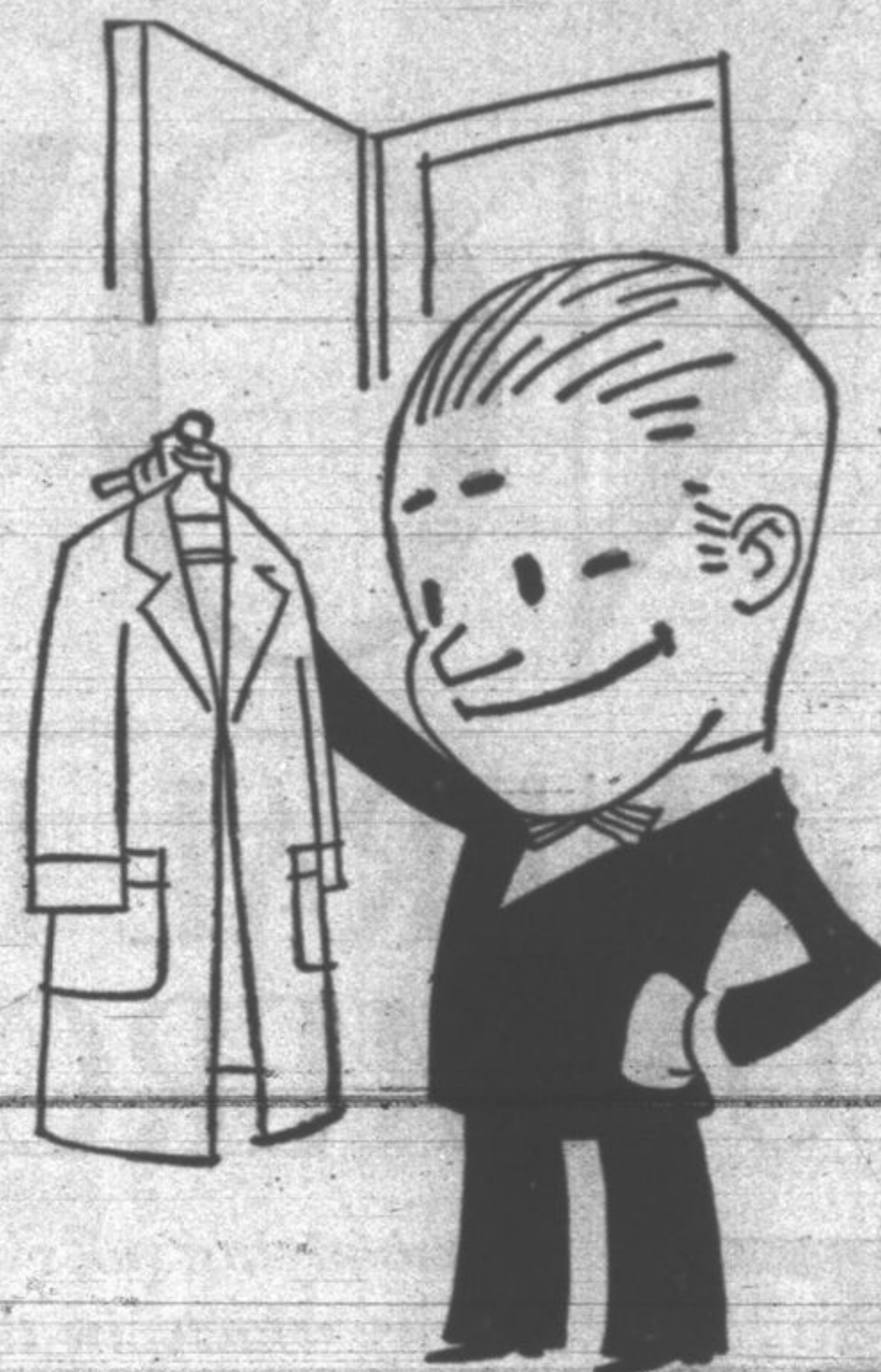
Corium Ultimas' Odalia, owned by F. J. Ruepiv, Fond du Lac, Wisconsin,

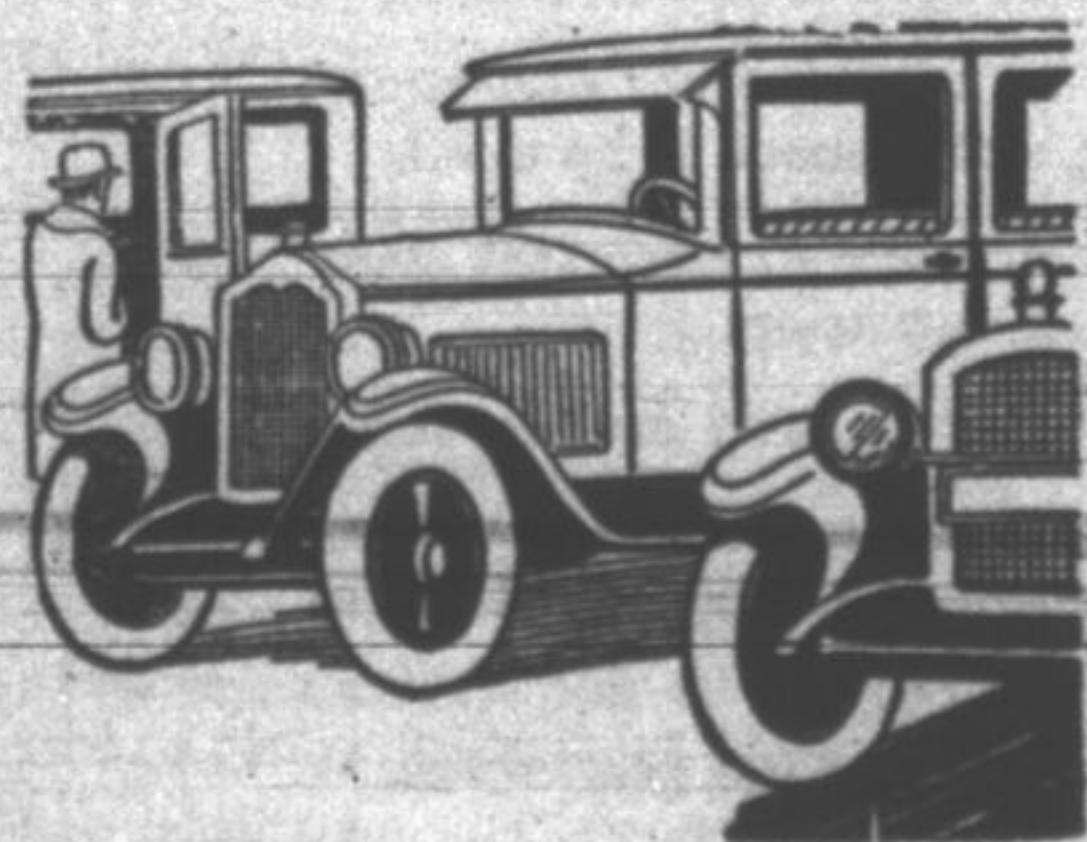
