**Auto Radiators Need
Frost Protection Soon**

For the benefit of motorists who at this time of the year keep a watchful eye on the thermometer, the Chicago Motor club reports that the earliest fall freezing temperature in the history of the Chicago weather bureau was recorded on Sept. 0, 1899. The average period of the year when freezing temperatures arrive in this area is from Oct. 15 to 20. The mechanical first aid department of the motor club, however, recommends that car owners protect the cooling system of their cars previous to that period.
