Highwood Defeats American Peaches 7-6

After trailing the Evening American team for the first half of a strenuous game the Highwood grid warriors came through with a touchdown and try for point to win the game. The Peaches also scored in the final quarter but the kick went wide and although a menacing passing attack was launched it was held up and before any damage was done the game was over.

This game was a real test for Highwood as the Peaches are rated as a very strong team which it certainly showed the crowd it was.

The entire first half was played in Highwood territory due to the absence of Shannon, Highwood's toe artist more than any other reason, as the teams were otherwise threatened but each time the boys held them on downs.

The break of the deadlock came in the third quarter when Cronkhite of Highwood smashed the line for a 12 yard gain. The Boylan brothers each made a first down putting the ball on the eight yard line from where Allens dashed through tackle for the touchdown. Cronkhite passed to Hutchinson over the line for the extra point.

The scrimmage was then up and down the field without any score featured by the deadly tackling of

Hutchinson and the end runs of the Peaches half, Buhusky.

Hutchinson made six consecutive tackles in the third quarter.

Late in the last quarter Buhusky dashed around a pile made up of both teams for a touchdown from the ten yard line. The try for point failed. The game ended with the Peaches trying to score via the air:

Superior Schools in County Hold Position

All nine of the Superior schools in the county retained their ranking with the state and one more school was scheduled for the honor following inspection completed last week in Lake county by U. J. Hoffman, assistant superintendent of public instruction of Illinois.

The schools rated as superiors are Hawthorn, Wadsworth, Bonnie Brook, Wilson, Ridge, Ingleside, Lotus Country, Lake Villa and Cedar Lake.

Oakland school east of Antioch, probably will get a superior rating.

In the entire state there have been but 60 superior schools created and many of these have lapsed back into the Standard class through the inability to keep the teaching and buildings to the highest rank. Mr. Hoffman pointed out.

"These superior schools recognize the fact that about 90 per cent of the value is in the teacher and 10 per cent in building, equipment, and community interest," the state official declared.

Lewis V. Morgan, county superintendent of schools in DuPuge county, made the tour of inspection with Mr. Hoffman and T. A. Simpson, county superintendent here.
